Abraham S. Levey Honored By Appreciative Federation Board Which Bestows Presidency Upon Him For Third Consecutive Term

To Be Assisted By Able And Experienced Leadership In Key Committee Jobs

Yielding to the insistent demand of an appreciative Board of Directors, which refused to take "NO" for an answer, Abraham S. Levey accepted for the third consecutive time the Presidency of the Jewish Federation of Portland. Although Mr. Levey had expressed his earnest belief that the Federation had developed within its young ranks new leadership able to take over, the Board insisted that in view of the much greater and more serious demands, which would be made on the Federation, that his experience and mature judgment was urgently needed during the coming year.

To assist Mr. Levey with the great many administrative details of the organization, two Vice-Presidents—Mrs. Israel Bernstein and Mr. Saul G. Chason—were elected. William Goodman was chosen again for the post of Federation Treasurer, a position which he has filled with his usual efficiency. Norman I. Godfrey was re-elected Executive Secretary.

Because of the broad Federation program, which requires expert leadership in all fields, the following additional key appointments were made by the officers of the Federation:

Barnett I. Shur, Chairman Budget Committee; Sidney W. Wernick, Chairman Executive Committee; Jacob Sapiro, Chairman Finance Committee; Joe Wigon, Chairman Review Committee; Harold P. Nelson, Chairman Year Book.

In order to get wider representation on these important Federation Committees, the chairmen have already had a preliminary meeting to discuss the advisability of increasing the size of these committees, and the complete list of committee membership will be published in next week's "Bulletin."

It must certainly be a source of Jewish communal pride, to every Jewish contributor, to realize how adequately the Federation is fulfilling its every promise; it has met every challenge and is upholding in the finest and most dignified manner the richest traditions of Jewish charity and philanthropy. This year, more than ever before, it is the hope of Federation leaders that wider segments of our community will be invited to and will accept responsibility in the growing program of Federation activity. The Federation is now gearing itself to an all-out effort in preparation for the 1945 Campaign. As a result of the groundwork laid by Joe Wigon and his co-workers in last year's Campaign, every indication points to a successful "Over the Top" ef-

fort this year. Within the next few weeks the complete Campaign organization will be announced. There is a place for every Jewish citizen who wishes to volunteer. Won't you add your name to the list of those who give so unselfishly of their time and energy to raise the dollars which mean life to our suffering and persecuted brothers overseas, as well as the upbuilding of the Jewish Commonwealth in Palestine, and many other noble causes.

"The Bulletin," with the permission of the officers of Center Youth, is privileged to publish the statement in its entirety, since it indicates how significant and purposeful the project was in the minds of Mr. and Mrs. Philip W. Lown, whose generosity made possible the furnishings of the Youth Lounge.

To All Center Youth

My wife and I had looked forward with a great deal of anticipated pleasure to witness the dedication of the Youth Center on December 28th. You can therefore well imagine our deep disappointment in being prevented from attending on account of feeling indisposed on that day.

Any recognition given us that night rightfully belongs to those men and women in your community who have given so much of their time, of their efforts and of their resources, to make your magnificent Center possible. Our people all over the State are exceedingly proud of the continuous splendid achievements of the Portland Jewelry. My wife and I are also very happy, indeed, for the privilege to participate in worthy projects.

You hear nowadays a great deal about "spheres of influence." The other day I heard an interesting definition of it. "A sphere of influence consists of a big guy minding a little guy's business." May I suggest to the elders of your community that they do not follow the unfortunate trend of the times, but that they give the Youth full freedom of action in their new quarters.

To me, a Youth Center symbolizes the world of tomorrow. I feel that if we only could glimpse in the hearts and minds of our Youth of today, we would readily perceive that our National leaders of tomorrow will not be permitted to raise the noble aspirations of mankind, only to frustrate them repeatedly. I like to believe that this coming generation will demand that their National leaders carry out effectively in practice the noble principles enunciated in such famous documents as the Declaration of Independence and the Atlantic Char-

ter. I also would like to imagine that our Youth of today, when they attain their majority, will demand that the solemn promises made by political parties and confirmed by Presidential candidates prior to an election, that at least such pronouncements shall be considered as a mandate of the people and be made obligatory upon Congress to carry out forthwith the will of the people, regardless of any pressure from any source which may attempt to thwart it.

A Youth Center is significantly important because through such a Center, the Youth can be trained to co-ordinate their activities for mutual interests. They can learn that for any team to win in any game, there can be but one captain, instead of a presidium of eleven or fifteen. They can also learn that successful teamwork demands that each participant must subdue his individual ambitions and glory and strive for the common objective.

If our Youth of today will really learn these great lessons of unity and of co operation, and will translate them into their daily tasks and into their communal work of tomorrow, and if their leaders will fuse their thoughts, ideas and actions towards the common goal, then we can face the future with hope and confidence and with a gratified feeling that the Youth Center will serve its purpose nobly.

FLOTSAM

We haven't appeared in the last three issues because we were still smarting from F. D. R.'s labelling us and all columnists, excrescences.

Irving Davidson is one of the most skilled raconteurs (uptown language for storyteller) that we've heard in many a rosh chodesh. Everybody who heard him at the last Center Forum seemed to agree as to his ability. He alternately told humorous stories and then injected a more serious note as to the status of the Jews in contemporary life. This was not for contrast, but, as he later told us, simply to identify these stories with a people whose lives have been strangely productive of such a humor.

Lieutenants Bobby Stein (Navy) and Dave Astor are stationed together on Guadalcanal where they have run into Katherine Winsor's husband. She is the author of the recent best-seller, "Forever Amber," which has taken a terrific panning from the critics. Its 900 pages about the Restoration period in England are crammed full with the bawdiest and cheapest writing that we've read. We'd give a dollar to know how her husband really feels about the book. We'd also bet a dollar that he couldn't sell a copy to the natives in Guadalcanal.

It's hard to realize, but the members of the Jacob Cousins Post, Jewish War Veterans, have tramped through the same mud that their sons are now going through in France. Yet they have come back and adjusted themselves well to civilian life again. But it was not easy, and for this reason they are now undertaking an ambitious program to facilitate the same steps for the returning Jewish War Veterans of World War II.

Seventeen days into January, and for the first time this year, the military news is heartening. The report of the Russian capture of Warsaw is undoubtedly the most significant of all, for strategists are agreed that the shortest road to victory lies along the Warsaw-Berlin highway. The valiant Red Army will certainly relieve the pressure of Von Rundstedt's counter-offensive in the West. Here, again, there is undeniable proof that there is teamwork among the United Nations, as concerns military affairs.

But, after seventeen days in January, things are still bad politically among the Allies. The breaches between the powers are becoming wider, and if these go unchecked, we can kiss the Peace of World War II goodbye. Before the war has been won, the powers are jockeying for spheres of influence in Europe and Asia. Britain pays lip service to the Atlantic Charter while her Army is busy keeping democracy out of Greece and Italy. Mr. Stettinius and the American State Department disagree with the British policy but do nothing, strictly in keeping with the State Department's "Do Nothing" policy. Russia has had no trouble with occupied countries because her foreign policy is as well-equipped as her armies. We have left everything to military expediency, only to find out now that military expediency demands that we have a policy for occupied countries before we occupy them. World War I should have taught us that military victory doesn't mean anything without a political victory.
