From the desk of Rabbi Asch

Mishna: Pirke Avot 2:5

Hillel taught:

Do not withdraw from the community; Do not be sure of yourself till the day of your death; Do not judge your fellow human being till you stand in his situation; Do not say, "It is not possible to understand this," for ultimately it will be understood; Do not say, "When I have leisure I will study," for you may never have leisure.


As we enter the beginning of our second year of this pandemic, I've been thinking about what wisdom Jewish texts have to share with us today. The text above was in the Kabbalat Shabbat section of the prayer book we used at college, so for four years, I read it nearly every week. I think it can offer us some wisdom today.

Do not withdraw from the community. We aren't seeing many people in person, and that means it is harder to make social connections with those outside of our immediate circles of family and close friends. But we need social connection more than ever. This month, take the time to pick up the phone and call someone you haven't spoken with in a while or come to a TBE event. Create an even broader community.

Do not be sure of yourself until the day of your death. There are so many things we do not know and it can be hard to live with uncertainty. This text points out that not being too sure of yourself can actually be positive. This past year has certainly taught us that we do not know what the future brings.

Do not judge your fellow human being till you stand in his situation. This year has been rife with political divisions and judgment. Not judging others (or not giving too much mental energy to those with opposing points of view) frees us from a cycle of frustration and hatred. Many TBE members have stopped tuning into the news on Shabbat and report feeling happier on Saturday than they do most of the week. A break from judgement means a mental break for us as well.

Do not say, "It is not possible to understand this," for ultimately it will be understood. This past year has shown us that scientific ingenuity is thriving. From the creation of Covid vaccines in record time, to the recent landing of the Perseverance on Mars, we have seen our understanding of our world and beyond grow. While there are plenty of mysteries still out there, we humans have and amazing ability to learn, adapt and discover.

Hello from New Board Member Mike Levey

Hello Temple Beth El. Although I have been on your Board for one year, COVID-19 has taken away our opportunity to get to know each other in person. As a result, I still feel quite the newcomer to the Congregation and the Board. This, then, is my way of introducing myself.

First and foremost, I am retired (although sometimes it doesn't feel that way). My first spouse, Cheryl Harrington, and I are divorced. We have two grown children with spouses/ partners and three grandchildren, two of whom are either driving or taking driver's ed! I am married to Michael Susan Brown, and we had our 33rd anniversary last August. Mike Brown is best stepparent in the history of the world.

I have lived and worked in Winthrop since 1975. I practiced law in a general practice law office on Main Street in Winthrop, known primarily as Levey and Wagley, more recently and now known as Levey, Wagley, Putman and Eccher. Most of our clients were from the central Maine area. I practiced mostly in the District and Superior Courts in Augusta.

I was on the Winthrop School Board, and the Winthrop Recreation Committee (many years ago). I was an active member of the YMCA in Augusta (the old one on Winthrop Street). I was a member of Maine's Family Law Advisory Commission, appointed by two Maine Chief Justices, which met in Augusta. I served on Maine's Commission on Sexual Assault and Domestic Abuse, appointed by Governor King. I shopped at the big grocery stores in Augusta (I am now loyal to the not-so-brand-new Hannaford in Winthrop). I spent lots of time shopping at Mr. Paperback, and now at Barnes and Noble in Augusta. I am on the Board of the Maine Justice Foundation, located in Hallowell, a foundation which helps fund legal aid. As you can see, my personal and professional life for almost 50 years has been situated right in the middle of the Winthrop/Augusta/ central Maine area.

Have you noticed something missing from this substantial local history? Almost 50 years, and where is the Temple in this story? Where are the Jews? What gives? Here then is my Jewish history.

During childhood, and college, I had a connection with Jewish life. I was active in the Parkersburg, West Virginia reform Temple, B'nai Israel. It was 50 families, plus or minus, congregation with several of the families having school age children in the age range of me, my older sister and younger brother. These families were very close and spent a huge amount of time together. (The reason for this is a worthwhile separate discussion.) I feel like I was raised by the Leveys, the Gottliebs, the Robbins, the Sterns, the Cremers, the Irvins, the Blockers, the Ardmans, and many others.

In addition to the local close Jewish community, my extended family Jewish connection was strong. My parents were from Brooklyn (Conservative/Orthodox Jews), and moved to WV in 1941, three years before I was born. We visited New York, before there was a New Jersey Turnpike, several times a year to see Grandma Kate Levey and many aunts, uncles and cousins. My WV home was distinctly Jewish. I attended Sunday School, was Bar Mitzvah and Confirmed. I was active in Temple Youth Group and attended lots of state-wide and regional conclaves and camps (OVFTYtoot two-week summer camp in Zionsville, Indiana, remember that anyone?) *continued on page 4*

I attended college at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio. I was a member of Sigma Alpha Mu Fraternity, one of the three Jewish Fraternities on campus. Miami U was strongly affiliated with Fraternity/Sorority life, and my life at college involved mostly Jewish friends associated the Fraternity. I did not participate in services or other religious events. College was also, in retrospect, a time during which I noticed a contrast from my small-town Jewish background, from the urban/ big city suburban Jewish life which existed in my Fraternity. Two different Jewish experiences. (By the way, I liked my childhood and college lives immensely! Don't get me wrong. I recognize the two different worlds in which I was travelling.)

My participation in Jewish life began to diminish at the time I went to law school. I went to law school at the University of Cincinnati and did not affiliate with Jewish groups or a Temple. I did not participate in Jewish rituals or activities. I met and married my first wife, Cheryl, who is not Jewish. We respected each other's ethnic and religious feelings, and neither of us imposed on the other. We celebrated Chanukah and Passover, in an ethnic way, and visited lots with my extended Jewish family and friends. We celebrated Christmas without church and spent time with Cheryl's Protestant extended family. Our children did not have a Temple or a Church. They were raised without a religious upbringing.

After 5 years of practicing law in Ohio, we moved to Maine, moved to Winthrop in1974, a community with very few Jewish people, and that's where I have been ever since. Mike Brown and I married in 1985. She is not Jewish. We fully accept each other's religious feelings and do not ask each other to "come my way."

My work and community activities brought me in touch with local Jews. Jewish lawyers. Jewish clients. Jews involved in community activities. You can't be Jewish and not know other Jews in your neighborhood. The Jewish connection, from a distance, remained a part of my life. I continued my ethnic emotional loyalty. I maintained close relationships with my family and my childhood and college Jewish friends. I also met and made friends with Jews in the community. After my first law partner in the practice moved away, I teamed up in practice with Steve Wessler, then married to Ellen Freed (of whom you might have heard). We were good friends with Nancy Ross and George Viles. I knew George before he was Jewish! And I liked him even then. Sumner and David Lipman, Roger Katz, Harold Shapiro, Richard Goldman, Peter Bickerman (my kitchen cabinet, friend, and golf partner), Seth Greene, (I'm sure I'm overlooking other names) became known to me and very much liked by me.

I did not join or participate in the Temple but was aware of it. I volunteered to assist the Temple from time to time with social service activities. I delivered some meals with other Temple volunteers at free mealtime events. I washed pots and pans as a part of the Temple volunteer corps. I assisted the Temple with its acquisition of some adjacent property, the parking lot, and saw the Board in action. Jerry Bley roped me into that. It was a pleasure. I got to know Rabbi Susan, which was and is a great honor for me. (Ask me about the time she and I went to an event at a Temple in Portland- it's a great story for another time!) My contact with Rabbi Susan led me to join the Temple, more to participate with financial support than to become active. My membership caused the Temple to become more visible. Its commitment to social service and social justice was attractive. The Temple appeared to be a blend of Jews, converts, partners and "fellow travelers" which felt tolerant and open, a good thing in my opinion.
