They soon filled up all the benches downstairs, These bakers of bread and the weavers of wool while above their heads the women tread and the balcony was full.

Dear Gentlepersons:

The Trustees of the JCEA have established a policy in respect to disbursements of the income and principal of its funds, which is intended to assist you in your financial planning.

A. Funds will be available to organizations to assist them in creating new and innovative cultural and educational Jewish programs which they sponsor. Requests for grants should be received by the JCEA Trustees on or before Yom Kippur each year, containing sufficient detail upon which the Trustees may consider the request. This should include: (1) description of the program (preferably of interest to the entire Jewish Community) (2) total estimated cost; (3) source of money which will be developed by the organization to defray the cost; and (4) amount of grant requested. The Trustees will award grants to the extent of their ability on or before December 10 each year for payment in the following year.

B. The substance of the JCEA fund will continue to be maintained and grown to be available for any extraordinary capital needs of those organizations providing Jewish cultural and educational programs to the community.

We believe that these policies will best serve the organizations to whom we are committed pursuant to the mission of the Associates.


