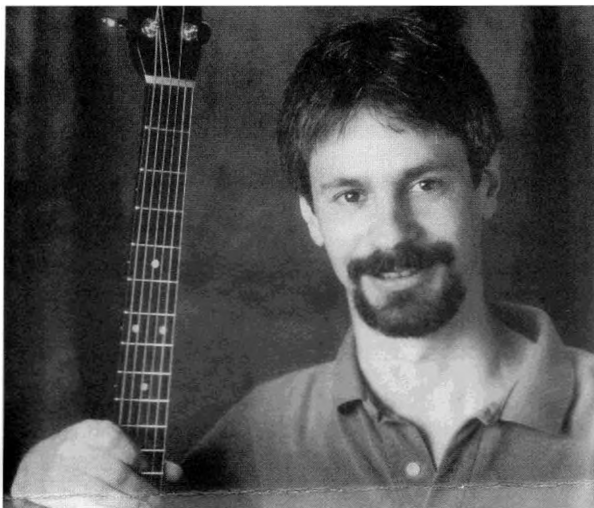

Erica Policow, daughter of Ellen and Neil Policow of Sharon, Mass. and granddaughter of Libby and Nate Smith of Bangor, was recently honored at the ADL Annual Dinner held in Boston. She was cited for the stand she took against Anti-Semitic remarks made during a soccer match with a neighboring town. Her speech from that evening follows.

During the last 10 minutes of a night soccer game in Mansfield, Massachusetts, I was subjected to a barrage of anti-Semitism. It was a zero to zero score and each girl was playing to their fullest. It didn't help that the Sharon J.V. soccer team only had eleven players to start and therefore there were no girls for substitution. I myself am a defensive player and my position is in front of the goal. Throughout the second half there were four Mansfield boys sitting on a bench behind the goal. At first there were occasional comments about how we play, about girls playing soccer in general, and then about how we looked. This was nothing new. There are always a few obnoxious parents or students in the crowd yelling out and so we have become accustomed to sideline comments. Yet never before this game had we experienced the type of comments these boys made. They screamed out "Kikes" repeatedly and then asked the riddle out loud, "What's the difference between a pizza and a Jew?" They answered their own riddle, shouting, "A pizza doesn't scream when you put it in the oven." When I heard the Anti-Semitic slurs, I didn't have to think about it. I just knew that the rest of the team and I did not have to listen to it. I approached the referee, who, by the way, is a pretty tough ref, and asked him to stop the game. It is very unusual for a student athlete to stop a game. In fact, my mother was in the stands and when she saw me approach the ref she was afraid that I might be ejected. But when I told the ref what the boys

were saying, he agreed that the comments were unacceptable and he asked the boys to leave. Then he informed the coaches of both teams why I had stopped the game and why he had removed the boys from behind the goal. After the game the Mansfield coaches tried to identify the perpetrators. They also apologized to our team on behalf of the entire community of Mansfield. They were clearly embarrassed and upset. Since that time I know the coaches, the Athletic Directors and the principals of both towns along with the referee have been working with the ADL to educate people about this incident.

If you had asked me right then to tell you why I did what I did I couldn't tell you. I just knew that those spectators had crossed the line and no one should have to listen to that type of hatred. Now that I've thought about this experience I feel I can understand the factors that pushed me to act. First I know the difference between right and wrong, and this situation was clearly wrong. The other factor is that I've learned from my family that whatever needs to be done, I can deal with it. That is what I did. I stood up against anti-Semitism.

But I never expected that this decision to speak out would result in an all day sensitivity training at Mansfield High School or an effort to bring students from different schools together to learn about each other. And I couldn't imagine that this would lead me to be invited to give this speech here tonight.

The fact that I am sitting here now telling you all what happened is a shock, but I'm happy to be given the opportunity to share this incident with you. I am thankful I have the ADL being me and supporting me in my decision to fight against bigotry.

• **CONGREGATION BETH EL**, Bangor's Reform synagogue, is located at 183 French Street, Bangor. Unless indicated otherwise, all events take place at the synagogue. All are welcome. For more information on the synagogue or its activities, call Beth El at 945-4578.

• **FRIDAY EVENING SHABBAT WORSHIP** — Services will take place at 7:30 p.m. on the following dates: January 2 and 16, and February 6 and 20. Free babysitting and a playroom for young children are provided. Services are followed by an Oneg Shabbat.

Youth Aliyah

Sometimes facing the future is hard for Israeli-born children. In Israel today, nearly half a million Jews live below the poverty level. Many are impoverished second-and third-generation immigrants who never fully integrated into Israeli life. In these communities, thousands of children and teens suffer in school and at home. From one-on-one support from teachers, counselors and social workers, to language lessons and classes on Jewish heritage to hot meals and warm clothes, students are provided with everything they need to become productive Israelis.
