The JCC had a busy schedule of events during the first half of 1997. On Feb. 2, a musical program of artists from throughout the community played to a standing room only crowd at Beth Israel's Epstein Room. Over 250 people attended.

The program was followed by the Downeast Film Festival, a series of three Jewish films shown at the University of Maine, sponsored by the JCC along with the U. of ME's Hillel chapter. The films were "The Quarrel" (Canadian), "Leon, the Pig Farmer" (British) and "Blind Man's Bluff" (Israeli).

Yom Hashoah, Holocaust Remembrance Day, was marked by a program at Beth Abraham: the showing of Steven Spielberg's film, "Survivors of the Holocaust." As a result of that program, several educators have decided to show the film to students in local schools.

## **Celebration held to Honor** Rabbi Henry J. Isaacs

In anticipation of another thirty-six years of devoted service, the members of Congregation Beth Abraham honored Rabbi and Mrs. Henry Isaacs at a luncheon on Saturday, May 17, 1997.

After serving as Chaplain at Loring Air Force Base, Rabbi Isaacs came to Beth Abraham in September, 1960. Since that time he has been the driving force in maintaining an Orthodox Jewish presence in Bangor. Through his efforts, a Hebrew Day School was established in this city where it continued for twenty-one years. Jewish education has always been a priority for him, and now several of his former students are rabbis, while others have become professionals in medicine, law, business and education. Rabbi Isaacs is the principal of the Beth Abraham Religious School and also holds weekly classes for adults.

Thirty-six, which is a significant number in Jewish life, was the theme outlining the many goals Rabbi Isaacs has accomplished since his arrival here.

Jerry Kirstein, master of ceremonies for the afternoon, was one of a number of speakers who offered personal insight into Rabbi Isaac's career in Bangor. Louis Kornreich, congregation president, Mickey Schneider, and Dr. Irwin Pasternak also spoke about the Rabbi's involvement in the synagogue and community. Naomi Podolsky gave a brief


