## BATH JEWS DEDICATE SYNAGOGUE

Beth Israel Synagogue, the now house of worship of the Jewish community of Bath, Maine, was formally dedicated as a place of worship Wednesday night.

The dedication exercises began Sunday afternoon when 250 local Jews and many out of town guests were present. Children gathered at the home of Rabbi Charles Arik. High street, and marched to Music Hall, carrying flags. The key to the new synagogue was auctioned off to Max Cohen and Samuel Povich, they thereby gaining the honor of opening the door for the exercises. The right to have the honor to carry the Torah from Music Hall to the synagogue was bought by Nathan Povich and at five o'clock the procession started up Washington street to the new synagogue led by ex-service men Samuel Povich and Henry Gediman, accompanied by Samuel Greenblatt, a veteran of the Russian-Japanese war. The Torah was carried at the head of the procession by Nathan Singer of Brunswick under a canopy carried by G. B. Bloom, B. Urding and L. Abelon, followed by the children with

flags and the Ark was carried by A. Bloom, N. Small, Max Kutz and S. Shamban. They were followed by men of the congregation carrying a large Amorican-fag and after them followed the women with lighted candles.

Upon reaching the synagogue Messrs. Cohen and Povich opened the door and all assembled in the building and Max Cohen opened the service by singing the 30th Psalm. This was followed by prayer by Rubbl Churles Arik and chaptor 8, Kings 1-12 to 62 verse was read by Rubbl Arik and translated into English by Miss Bessie Brown. The 24th Psalm was read by Max Cohen and the 9ist Psalm by B. Gedmian and at the request of Rabbi Arik the national hymn was sung, led by Henry Gediman.

At the end of the service the Ladies' Auxiliary served a fine banquet to the congregation and guests. During the banquet addresses were mude by Rabbis Esrog, Licker and Brownstein, and' a colloction was taken for the world drive which netted \$500.
