Many Attend Mortgage Burning

Of Beth Israel Synagogue in Bath, Mc.—Judge Finansky, Guest Speaker

Bath, Ma.-Persons (rom this city as weil_das from Brunswick, Lewiston, Auburn, Rockland, Rumford, Gardiner, Portland, and Boston, attended the celebration of the burning of the mortgage on the Beth Israel Synagogue on Sunday, September 11.

Hon. Max Finanisky, former judge of the municipal court of Portland, and chief speaker of the occasion, addressed a gathering of 300 in the Synagogue, in observance of the bar mitzvah of Temple Both Israel which it celebrated after 13 years of arduous work, with a program of speakers and a dinner for members and friends.

Fittingly introduced by Louis M. Silverman of this city, whom Abraham Miller, president of the congregation, had invited to become master of ceremonies, as the outstanding Jew of the State of Maine, a man admired by the Christians and revered by the Jews, Judge Pinansky held the interest of all who heard him by the genuine sincerity of his words, felt by both old and young.

Speaking inspiringly, Rabbi Arik urged the young people always to consider the synagogue a light, even as their forefathers have in generations past. He also spoke in praise of the work done, mostly by the women.
