

Russia Withdraws Jewish Officials from Germany

Berlin, July 30 (JTA)—A concession by Russia's dictator, Josef Stalin, to the anti-Semitism of Germany's dictator, Adolf Hitler was seen last week in the withdrawal of high-ranking Russian Jewish diplomats from Germany.

The former Soviet Ambassador Jacob Suritz, is only one of a number of Jewish representatives who have been recalled by Russia. In connection with Hitler's reception to the new Russian Ambassador, Konstantin Yurenov, which was the occasion for conciliatory statements by the Fuehrer and in the Russian press, it was reported that the Jewish head of the Soviet embassy's press bureau, Gnjedin Help-hand, son of a well-known Russo-German Socialist, had been recalled.
