A Personal Message . . .

Many of my fellow Jews have spoken to me during the past several weeks expressing their amazement that a Federation Campaign of over \$120,000 could be as successful as ours has been . . . because we are going "Over the Top" within the next few weeks.

When we stop to think, it does seem almost unbelievable; then I realize that because of the real generosity of each of you this magnificent record was made possible . . . and it is a joy to express my humble thanks for the part you have played in this smashing success.

To the Campaign leaders, who never wavered in their intense and loyal devotion, who constantly kept the goal ahead, we each of us must pay our tribute. So many deserving and vital Jewish causes will now be stronger because of the work of men like George I. Lewis, Hyman Mersky; and women like Mrs. Anna Blumenthal and Mrs. Israel Bernstein, and many, many more too numerous to mention.

Yet I should like to remind you that our Federation is more than a fund raising organization, because through its efficient, business-like, and dignified methods, it has enabled organizations to improve the quality of their services and to enrich their program and content.

In only three years the Jewish community has contributed over a quarter million dollars, and it is significant to note that this huge sum has been raised with a minimum of campaign and administrative cost.

Another important aspect of Federation's program has been the strong ties of coöperative effort, which we have established with the War Chest, Red Cross, and other major activities in our community. Federation has truly been the voice of united Jewry, standing prepared and ready to do its full share to meet its duties and obligations to the community as a whole.

Working hand in hand with our Christian neighbors and leaders, the Jewish community, through the Federation, has been elevated to new stature, and has taken its rightful and prominent position in the civic and philanthropic life of the general community. Through our active association with these community agencies, Jewish institutions have shared about \$60,000 over a three-year period.

Motivated by the finest ideals of Jewish philanthropy, and guided by the highest spiritual principles of Charity, the Federation is at the same time founded upon realism; and so we know that we must be prepared to make even greater sacrifices in the years to come.

As Federation contributors, we have truly found inspiration in the Talmudic teaching "That our worldly possessions are given to us in trust by God, so that we may serve mankind and promote its welfare and happiness, for helping to alleviate the suffering of God's children brings great and true happiness, and thereby glorifies God's name."

LETTERS AND ALL: The following came from Headquarters of the Ninth Service Command to Mr. and Mrs. David Levinsky: A NINTH AIR FORCE SERVICE COMMAND UNIT, BELGIUM—Corp. Jack Levinsky, son of Mr. and Mrs. David Levinsky, 5 Montgomery St., is with a 9th Air Force Service Command mobile reclamation and repair unit in Belgium which was recently awarded the Meritorious Service Unit Plaque for its "superior performance in the repair and maintenance of aircraft in England, France, Belgium and Germany." Under adverse weather conditions, with inadequate clothing and equipment, Levinsky's unit assembled hundreds of fighter aircraft and light bombers in England at a time when they were urgently needed in the fight for air supremacy over Europe. On the continent they rolled through France and Belgium and into Germany, working in tents one day, hangars the next, returning to combat aircraft which participated in every phase of the Ninth Air Forces' brilliant campaign. Corporal Levinsky's job as Hydraulic specialist takes in all operational functions of the airplane. He entered the service in November, 1942, and has served more than 18 months overseas. (Directly from Hdqtrs. and quite a commendation. Our congrats.)

Lt. David Astor Wins Praise For Outstanding Work At Okinawa

We swelled with pride when our eye caught the following announcement published in the Quantico newspaper about our own Dave Astor, former editor of the "Bulletin," and so we reprint it here as a salute to Dave and all the boys with him who won such well-deserved praise.

OKINAWA, April 16—First Lt. David Astor, of Portland, Maine, former CO of Second Guard Company at Marine Barracks, Quantico, Va., has been commended with his officers and men for the outstanding work of their Sixth Amphibian Truck Company during unloading operations in the first weeks of the Marine and Army landings here.

Maj. Gen. Lemuel C. Shepherd, Jr., commanding general of the Sixth Marine Division, said in his letter of commendation that "during the first ten days of unloading of the present operation, the Sixth Amphibian Truck Company maintained an average of forty-eight amphibian trucks in operation out of a total of fifty, and at the end of the fifteenth day still had forty-five trucks in operation. That this was accomplished in spite of the recent organization of the unit, the scarcity of spare parts, the twenty-four hours unloading schedules, merits the highest praise."
