FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

Recently a radio commentator was musing over current "trendy" expressions, noting those popular phrases which deserve a speedy retirement from every-day conversation. For instance, to employ such passe terms as "the pits," "the bottom line" or "ballpark figure" is to betray your ignorance of what is "in" and what is "out" (these phrases definitely belonging to the "out" category). Your status as a member of the "out" group would be instantaneously revealed and confirmed to all were these expressions to appear in your daily chatter.

But who decides what is "in" and what is "out"? In-group/out-group relations have been the object of sociological research for years. Could the sociologists direct their studies to the Jewish Community Center? Is there an in-group/outgroup dynamic at the Portland JCC? As I look at the trend in membership, I find that our new members compose a diverse constituency. Indeed there are many different groups within the entire Center family: singles, families with children, couples, senior citizens, teens, - and amongst these native Portlanders and "transplants" from Massachusetts, New York, Ohio and beyond. All are working and living in the Greater Portland area, all are looking to the JCC to provide them with quality leisure time activities. With such a varied membership to serve, the Center cannot afford to focus on one group to the exclusion of others. From my point of view, each group is an "in" group, each with different needs, different interests and different ways of expressing themselves; but each one special and essential to the make-up of the Center family. The interests of one group should not displace the interests of the others.

If the Center membership is truly a family as we so often state, than all members should feel the warm welcome and friendly support that a real family provides. Just as being a member of your personal family implies certain responsibilities, membership in the Center family carries with it the charge to extend that warm feeling to others, to help other members feel "at home" at JCC programs. No in-group, no out-group. Let's leave

It's a long way from New York City to Maine, but the Gold family seems to have made the transition with ease. Originally from the Bronx, Joel moved to southern Maine approximately seven years ago with his wife Diana, a native of Brooklyn. Now the Golds, along with their two children, Elisabeth, 31/2 and Benjamin, 14 months, enjoy life in Portland where Joel works as an associate professor in the Business School at the University of Southern Maine. He is well known as a financial columnist for the Portland Press Herald and, in his spare time, he is a parttime broker registered with a local brokerage house. The demands of a new home and two children keep Diana rather busy. but she still has time to play an active role in the community as the recording secretary for Center Women's Club.

It will be four years this summer that the Golds have been Center members. For the past two years, Joel has served the Center as Membership Vice-President. Joel took the leadership position because he "saw a need to open up the Center to the average Jewish person." Specifically, he felt that his input could help the Center program more accurately reflect the needs of the entire Jewish community. It's been two years of hard work for Joel, the most intense part of which involved the community-wide survey which Joel and his membership committee developed and co-ordinated. The results of the survey were used as guidelines in the development of current Center programming.

It is the upswing in Center programming that is most encouraging to both Diana and Joel. "Babysitting is just one of the little extra touches the Center provides that makes programming better, more accessible," says Diana. But, as with so many Center families, the Golds see the construction of a building as paramount to the Center's future.

"It doesn't have to be a multi-million dollar structure," says Joel, "but whatever

"It's easy to feel a sense of being Jewish in New York — everybody else seems to be Jewish too!," says Diana, "but in a small city like Portland, a Center is important to preserve the Jewish atmosphere. With our own building, we'd have a place to meet and mingle."

Meeting new people is something the Golds enjoy and both Joel and Diana hope that new people will join the Center. New people bring new ideas and fresh interests to the J.C.C.

"The Center's focus should be on the newcomers" says Joel. "They are the Center's future leadership and we should be actively seeking their participation, taking the initiative in drawing the newcomers into the Center family."

The Golds are hopeful about the Center's future. And with the continued support and participation of the Golds, the Center's future also looks hopeful.
