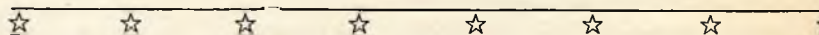

## Edward J. Berman Heads Delegates J. W. B. Convention

Mr. Edward J. Berman, president of the Jewish Community Center, will head a delegation to the 34th Annual Convention of the New England Section, Jewish Welfare Board, to be held on Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 21st and 22nd, at the Lynn Jewish Community Center and Hotel Kenmore, Boston.

The Saturday evening program will be held at the Jewish Community Center of Lynn. Preceding the Executive Board dinner, the guests and the delegates will be conducted on a tour of the Center. The Executive Board dinner, that evening, will feature a discussion on "Post-war Society and the Jewish Community". Following the dinner and discussion, there will be a reception and dance.

The sessions on Sunday, at the Hotel Kenmore, will include a business session and reports of the Special Survey Committee of the New England Federation. The luncheon speaker will be Mr. Emil N.
