## Federation C-Day Campaign, Jan. 9

The bitter tragedy of flood disaster in the State of Israel has impelled the Jewish community of Portland to launch a total and all-out effort of relief.

Your announcement of an unusually devastating rainfall in Israel this year causing catastrophic suffering — as if it were the destiny of Israel to be tested only by the severest of oppression — has evoked a spontaneous response from this city, a determination that assistance must be forthcoming at once.

The Jewish Federation of Portland, therefore,—in solemn recognition that Israel must survive at any cost and that no disillusionment, however natural under the circumstances, shall be permitted to wither the spirit of the noble pioneers of Israel—has embarked upon a C-Day Campaign, a Collection Day Campaign.

This campaign will be a two hour whirlwind coverage of the entire Jewish community of Portland on Sunday morning, Jan. 29, 1950. We are certain of its success.

As President of the Jewish Federation of Portland, it is indeed my esteemed privilege to notify you that Portland, Maine has reaffirmed its faith in Israel and in the unbreakable will of the Israeli people to surmount even those obstacles which try men's souls to the breaking point.

We have every confidence that our C-Day Campaign will produce a substantial fund to assist in relieving the present emergency and saving the lives and homes of the 90,000 camp-dwellers who face disaster.

We shall not fail you. This is our pledge.

## Jewish Chaplains To Have Retreats

NEW YORK—Religious retreats for Jewish chaplains serving the Armed Forces in the Hawaiian Islands and the Caribbean area will be conducted during January and February by two rabbis affiliated with the Division of Religious Activities (DRA) of the National Jewish Welfare Board. Rabbi Abraham Feldman, spiritual leader of Congregation Beth Israel, Hartford, Conn., and former president of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, will conduct the retreat in the Hawaiian Islands and Rabbi David Max Eichhorn, former Army chaplain and now director of field operations of the Division of Religious Activities of JWB is conducting two retreats in the Caribbean.

These retreats are part of the Department of Defense's announced policy of sending teams of civilian clergymen—two Protestant ministers, a Roman Catholic priest and a rabbi—to the six theatres of operations overseas (Alaska, England, Hawaii, Japan, Europe and Caribbean) annually.

## Initiate Program Of Jewish Music

NEW YORK—The National Jewish Music Council, sponsored by the National Jewish Welfare Board, this week initiated steps toward creating a permanent instrument for furthering good relations, mutual protection and exchange of material and information between American musicians dedicated to Jewish music and Israeli musicians. The National Jewish Music Council is the coordinator of National Jewish Music Festival, the sixth annual observance of which begins on February 4 and continues until March 3.

As the only all-inclusive national body representing American community interest in Jewish music, the National Jewish Music Council invited American composers, arrangers and performers concerned with Jewish music and a spokesman of the Israeli Association of Composers to a conference to consider means of establishing the joint program. Mrs. Frank Cohen, chairman of the Jewish Music Council, who presided at the meeting, held in New York, said its objective was to map a sound, creative and effective working relationship between American composers and performers of Jewish music and composers and publishers of Jewish music in Israel.

The meeting agreed on the need for such an understanding and decided to name a committee representative of the American Jewish community and of composers of Jewish music in this country and in Israel to draft a statement embodying principles and policies. A parallel committee with similar objectives and with American representation is to be set up in Israel.

## Plan Observance Of Youth Week

DETROIT—The third annual Jewish Youth Week, held under the auspices of the National Jewish Youth Conference, which is sponsored by the National Jewish Welfare Board, will be observed nationally from March 24 to 31. This was announced by Arnulf Pins, Conference chairman, at the close of the quarterly meeting of the Conference executive committee held here.

A nationwide body, the National Jewish Youth Conference is composed of delegates from some 300 local and regional Jewish youth and young adult councils and from most of the national Jewish youth organizations.

The results of a mail ballot for Conference officers other than the chairman—he was elected at the annual assembly in September—made public by the executive committee—resulted in the election of the following: Vice-chairmen—Helene Fishbein and Selig Rubinrott, Brooklyn; Ruth Schaffer, Cleveland; Norman Schiff, Newark; Stanley H. Swig, Boston, and David Wagner, Walden, N. Y.; Secretaries—Gloria Cohen, St. Louis, and Manfred Ohrenstein, Brooklyn; Treasurer—Victor Karp, Cleveland.

"Working Together—Jewish Youth Build" was selected as the theme for 1950's Jewish Youth Week. Acting on a report by Selig Rubinrott, program chairman, the executive committee approved plans for a package of Youth Week interpretation material, including a new poster for use by local communities and national Jewish youth organizations. Other program materials to be issued include a manual of suggestions for observing Youth Week, a radio script, a bulletin on "Social Action by Youth and Young Adult Councils" and a catalogue of National Jewish Youth Conference publications.
