A Chanukah Message

There is awesome mystery and grandeur in a candle in an otherwise dark room, particularly when we are accustomed to the brilliance of electric illumination in our homes. There is manifold versatility in the gentle flame. It speaks to us in a wordless tongue through the inaudible vibrations of our heart strings. In Jewish life, various types of candles are lit at various occasions. There is the Sabbath candle. Its message is one of holiness and purity; rest and sublimity are its tidings.

There is also the "Yahrzeit" can-

dle: a lone candle in a corner of the house in memory of one whose light and love we miss. It flickers mournfully with yearning and reverence in its quiet flame. It is a

memorial light.

Then, there is the Chanukah candle. This candle has varying messages. It speaks of modest sanctity, of valor, of memory and hope.

Religiously, Chanukah represents the triumph of the Jewish faith over the pagan Greek culture. The Jewish faith was faced with a formidable enemy who would force-fully impose upon them sterile idolatry with its corrupt living. The exhortative voice of the prophets, so effective in previous generations, was not sufficient now to stem the tide of paganism. cal force was needed to buttress the burning zeal and devotion of the pious. The triumph of the Maccabees assured the continuity of the religion of spirit. It was a triumph of morality, goodness and purity of the Jewish faith over the sensuality, selfishness and vulgarity of heathenism.

Nationally, Chanukah focuses our attention to the unquestionable nationhood of the Jewish people. When we persist in celebrating a national victory for over 2,000 years, then we demonstrate to all the world and to the perplexed within our fold that we never cease to exist and function as a nation. Nor have we ever surrendered the hope of full reconstitution. In the words of Benjamin Disraeli: "The vineyards of Israel have ceased to exist, but the eternal law enjoins the children of Israel to celebrate the vintage. A race that persists in celebrating their vintage, although they have no fruits to gather, will regain their vineyard."

Universally, Chanukah is a symbol and landmark in the long struggle of mankind for freedom of conscience. Many wars for the protection of land, home and hearth antedated the epic of the Maccabees, but the latter was the first armed defense of the truth faith, and free-dom of worship. The "Feast of Lights" manifested, too, that a mighty sword of the arrogant can be shattered against the rock of the unwielding human spirit and perseverance. The Chanukah light, which we shall kindle in our homes, beginning with Sunday evening. December 10 this year, will link the current Maccabees with their ancient predecessors in the struggle for freedom, justice and conscience.

Let us light the candles for positive, meaningful religious living: reconstitution of the land and nation of Israel and universal freedom.
