Federation Budget Committee Submits Complete Report To Community

Because the Jewish Federation sincerely believes that it is the responsibility of each contributor to be completely informed about the method by which Federation funds are allocated, the "Bulletin" is pleased to publish herewith highlights from the Budget Report submitted by Chairman Barnett I. Shur to the Federation Board of Directors in behalf of the Budget Committee. The report indicates the thoroughness and diligence of all the committees' members, who recognized the urgency of their job. The community is indebted to these men and women for the difficult task, efficiently and honestly done.

The Budget Committee Reports . . .

Before presenting the Budget in detail I think it might be interesting and perhaps of some value if I explained the procedure followed by the Budget Committee in coming to its final recommendations.

On January 16, 1945, letters were sent out to the various participating agencies of the Federation, asking each of these agencies to send in their requests accompanied by detailed information of their finances and activities. As these requests came in, they were immediately assigned to a proper sub-committee,—the Budget Committee having been previously divided into five major groups.

1. Local
2. Overseas
3. Yeshivas and Educational Institutions
4. National Service and Health
5. Administration and Campaign

The preliminary investigation into the demands of each of these agencies was made by the appropriate sub-committee, which in turn submitted a recommendation to the full Budget Committee. In many instances, particularly in cases where the agency was either local or had local representation, an opportunity was given to such agency to have its case presented orally to the full Budget Committee, and on each of these occasions those representatives were listened to attentively and given a fair and impartial hearing.

Obviously, it was impossible to meet the full request of each agency. To have done so, would have required the committee to bring in a report asking this community to raise the sum of \$195,000. Even the most generous and optimistic among us instantly recognized the impossibility of raising such an amount. Thus we were presented with the difficult task of attempting to recognize the needs, and to properly evaluate such needs in terms of known and expressed community interests and the estimated ability of the Jewish people of Portland to produce the money.

Then began the paring down process. That was not an easy task. It is not easy to tell agencies that are saving lives or are providing a haven of refuge for the tortured peoples of Europe that this city can not give them sufficient money for their needs. It is not easy to tell agencies whose programs call for better Americanism and a fuller development of Jewish life locally and nationally that we can not give them what we know they should have. But, in the mind of each member of this committee there always arose the question as to how much the community could reasonably be expected to contribute to all of these worthy organizations.

Our discussions were numerous and lengthy. Different ideologies

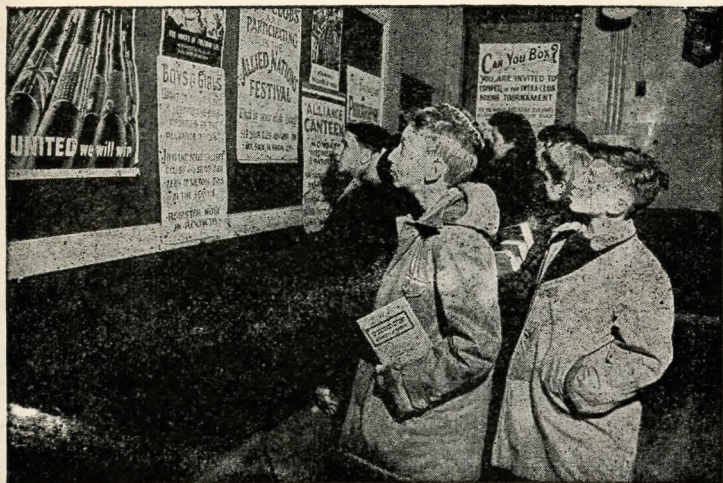

Just before Cedric Foster's address at the Center last week, we had a discussion with a conservative man, concerning the Hearst syndicate's fair-haired boy, Westbrook Pegler. The worst he could say about Westbrook and the ideas he peddles in his column, was that he was sometimes "monotonous." To us, Pegler is the most dangerous and insidious writer in America today. He is dangerous because his ideas, if realized, would have this country as totalitarian as Hitler's Germany. He is insidious because he is clever, and it is, sometimes, very hard to detect the fallacy in his logic.

His latest program, apart from his constant sniping at labor, consists of a subtle attack on Minority groups in this country, under a series of columns called George Spelvin, American. It was too hot for Roy Howard (Scripps-Howard chain) to handle in the World Telegram, so he sold Pegler's syndicate to the most logical buyer, Hearst's King Features. A collection of these columns on George Spelvin are available in this month's copy of "Read," a pocket magazine.

If you read his column regularly, you will have noticed a constant attack on the Blue Network and Dan Gailmore, a very fine liberal commentator. Because Gailmore was democratic, and therefore completely unlike himself, he made Gailmore the target of much abuse. Pegler referred to him as an ex-convict, who had just been released from a mental institution, and was now parroting the Party line over the radio. This is a half-truth, in which Pegler specializes. The true story is an interesting one and makes Gailmore a much greater man than Pegler could hope to be.

Dan Gailmore, an assumed name, was a successful rabbi with a large congregation in New York City a few years ago. He fell victim to a mental condition, known as "compulsion neurosis." This condition manifested itself in an overwhelming desire to drive an automobile at great speed over the roads. His friends, in an attempt to shake him of this, tried to keep him away from automobiles. But the impulse was too strong, so he stole an automo-

bile and was caught driving it around 90 miles an hour in upstate New York, where he was committed to a mental institution. Completely cured, he was given a chance, after telling his story, by the Blue Network officials. He has a wonderful voice, a great mind, and is succeeding in spite of Pegler, who will do anything to vilify a man who disagrees with him. We wish Pegler were monotonous instead of dangerous.

By way of contrast is Maurice Hindus, author, and Russia correspondent for the New York Herald Tribune. Hindus is considered one of the foremost American authorities on Russia, as his books "Mother Russia," "Humanity Uprooted," and "Red Bread," have proven. He will be in Portland, Saturday, April 7th, at the Portland High School auditorium, to lecture on "What I Saw in Russia." If you are interested in unbiased information on Russia and its present role in the war, we strongly suggest that you plan to hear Hindus.

Cedric Foster, the commentator who follows gravel-voiced Marjorie Mills on the Yankee Network, addressed a capacity audience at the Center, last week. We were surprised to find that he originates from Portland, being related to the Fosters of the old Foster-Avery Clothing Co. He gave a hurried treatment of the different war theaters and to the military and political aspects associated with each one. He claimed that the war in the Pacific involved great problems in logistics, due to the great spaces involved. Furthermore, we of the Occidental world find it hard to comprehend the Oriental minds of the Japanese with their conception of "Banzai," a complex which makes death by suicide a national honor. It is this willingness to die for the Sun gods which may prolong the war in the Pacific.

What Is The Future Of Jewish Education In Our Community?

Summary Of Report In Conjunction With The Jewish Education Survey

One is impressed with the concerned, sincere and intelligent interest and lay leadership power potential in the City of Portland. This interest and potential power are such as to make possible the attainment of high educational standards not only in the City of Portland but also in the entire State of Maine. It is important, however, that these be exploited immediately.

Four propositions were heard, namely:

A. Moving of the existing Hebrew School from its present location on Pearl Street into the Community Center Building.

B. Renovation of the present Hebrew School Building.

C. Establishment of a branch of the Hebrew School at Woodfords.

D. Erection of a new, modern, Central Hebrew School Building for the entire city.

Cooperation between the Talmud Torah and the Center should indeed be considered. The two should and must work together. Should renovations be planned in the present Talmud Torah Building, the surveyor would recommend improvement of the lighting system; discard of the worst desks; provision of teachers' desks and chairs; establishment of a principal's office; improvement of the school yard. It may be questioned whether the request that a branch be established at Woodfords, sincerely advanced, does not have a subconscious basis. The surveyor feels that the desire for a school at Woodfords to a large degree expresses all-around dissatisfaction with the present school to the point of not even dreaming that a school associated with the old district and the present conditions can possibly be made over to embody the best in religious education, which the parents of Woodfords are so solicitous of. There are many disadvantages to sub-dividing a small school. The sectioning and grading of pupils and co-curricular activities are aided by consolidation. Should the findings of the surveyor's studies indicate the advisability of one, rather than two schools, it would become necessary to consider its location and possibility of the school's providing transportation.

Any Central School, or for that matter even a new sectional school, should be housed in an appropriate school building and properly furnished, and having all the modern appurtenances. Conversion of a residence or business property is generally not advisable. The Educational Director, if he is to do the needed work, should not be burdened with a heavy teaching program. He should have the time to plan, supervise and direct the educational program. Accordingly, there should be three persons engaged, a kindergarten and primary teacher, a secretary, and another teacher. The first two should be women, and the third, a man.

Each person should be qualified by education, and personality for his position. Salaries must be kept high if the school is to attract the right people. Yet, because of the difficulties in securing professional personnel, it is suggested that local talent be scouted.

The nature, composition, election powers and duties of the Boards of Directors and Education should be defined and clarified in written documents. The Board of Directors should concern itself with physical and material affairs; the Board of Education with broad educational policies. Business details should be under the direction of the Board of Directors. Educational details should be left to the Educational Director, who will be the actual as well as the nominal head of the educational system. He should have the authority necessary for the successful execution of his approved plans and duties.

Establishment of a well-managed and inspiring Junior Congregation should receive consideration. Suggestions for a summer camp for the state and a summer day camp for the city are worthy educational enterprises.

The parents, too, must be educated. Fortunately, the young, intelligent parent is willing to make the school into a dynamic educational center for the Jewish community of Portland. Specific activities designed to bring parents and children closer to Jewish education, and thus to Judaism, such as organization of a parent-teacher association, a father-son or family breakfast on Sunday mornings, should be given serious consideration.

Jewish education for adolescents, male and female, from the ages of 13 to 20, should be provided. Judaism is founded on enlightened understanding of what one is asked to do. Our adolescents, who in a very short time will be adults, are really an idealistic lot, more serious minded than they are thought to be, with a great deal of energy, which if properly directed may alter the whole complexion of things. Cooperation between the Center and the Educational Director, in this connection, is specially significant.

Many interesting things can be done, and should be undertaken, if Portland is to become the effective Jewish educational laboratory and model that it can and should become.
