Can Any Mother Refuse To Feed An Orphaned Child A Meal A Day!

Dear friend:

May I visit with you for a few minutes? I want to talk with you about the Jewish Federation Campaign, and the responsibility that is ours as Jewish women.

First, there are some important factors. Through the Federation we support our own women's organizations.

B'nai B'rith Auxiliary
Center Women's Club
Council of Jewish Women
Hadassah
Mizrachi Women
Pioneer Women's Organization
Portland Hebrew School Auxiliary

These organizations are receiving funds from the Federation which in former years we had to raise through many appeals. Since we have joined the Federation we have not had city-wide ticket selling, Youth Aliyah campaigns, or separate Donor affairs.

The Federation includes war agencies. Through the Jewish Welfare Board, the Portland Army and Navy Committee, the Jewish War Veterans, our Jewish boys in service continue their contacts with Jewish life through religious services, through friendship and guidance, wherever they may be.

Think of Europe with the thousands of Jews who have survived the tortuous cruelty of the Nazis who are without homes, clothing or food and you can appreciate the problems of the Joint Distribution Committee. Think of Palestine as the hope of our people and how vital it is that the United Palestine Appeal have funds. Tears cannot help, your contributions will.

We have a Women's Division because regardless of what our husbands contribute, these organizations and causes are close to us as women; and we point with pride to our women's organizations through which we work to educate and guide our Jewish youth, to help our people, and to build a better America.

Second: This year there is to be no Women's Special Gifts Committee (there are only a few women who are in a special gifts group). From past experience we have learned that it is best to leave special gifts to the men's division; that we as women should work within a reasonable range that will represent a woman's personal understanding and response and her individual contribution. Our goal this year is to have every Jewish woman be a Donor, and because the number of organizations in this one campaign are so many, to be a Donor, the contribution is to be a pledge of \$36.00 that can be paid in payments of \$1.50 every two weeks or \$3.00 a month.

I know that there are many women who have to manage their home finances very carefully and that a Donor's pledge will mean some personal sacrifice; but I KNOW OF NO JEWISH WOMAN WHO WOULD REFUSE TO ASK HER TO FEED A JEWISH CHILD ORPHANED BY THE BRUTALITY OF THE NAZIS ONE MEAL A DAY. Be grateful that there is an organization like the JDC that will feed that child with our daily 10c. That is all I ask you to pledge to this campaign—10c a day, 15c a week, \$3.00 a month, \$36.00 for the year.

Thank you for your attention. I hope I have been able to make you feel as I do—that it is a sacred duty for each of us to give generously; not to make some personal sacrifices for these many Jewish causes would make us unworthy of the blessings of freedom and plenty we enjoy.

What will the international agreements mean to the Jewish people? What were the minority rights extended to Jewish and other minorities after the last War? Were they successful? Can we rely on these treaties again?

Will America intervene on behalf of the Jew? What is the historical record in this regard? These and other intriguing questions of the contemporary scene will be discussed by Dr. Aaron Margalith, noted authority on international law, on Tuesday, April 17, at 8:15 P. M., at the Jewish Community Center, under the auspices of the Portland Council for Adult Jewish Education.

Dr. Margalith is Associate Professor of International Law at Yeshiva College. He is the author of "International Mandates" and "American Intercession on behalf of Jews, 1840-1938."

Pierre Van Paassen To Be Presented Tuesday, April 24

The Portland Zionist District will present the distinguished author, Pierre Van Paassen, on Tuesday evening, April 24th, at the Jewish Community Center, at 8 P. M.

His current best seller, "The Forgotten Ally," which deals with the Palestine Problem and the World Jewish Question, has been acclaimed as a modern classic on that subject. The vivid portrayal of the support given to the Allied Armies by the Palestinian Jews, the heroic deeds, the intimate knowledge of the country and the people of Palestine are indeed a credit to this brilliant author and well deserve the acclaim. Best sellers are not new to Mr. Van Paassen. "Days Of Our Years" sold close to a half million copies. In 1941 "The Time Is

Now" was published and is an outstanding work on the subject of Nazi world domination. In this book Mr. Van Paassen discusses the counter-measures that would have to be taken by the democracies. Later that same year "That Day Alone" was published and was hailed as a major work which, in a highly individual manner, brings world affairs to life through vivid dramatizations of historic events.

Mr. Van Paassen is well known in the field of journalism and as a war correspondent, having held the positions of reporter, editorial writer and feature writer, for some of the most important daily papers in the United States and Canada.

Born in Holland of a Flemish family and educated in that country, Mr. Van Paassen's family came to Canada when he was a young man. As a volunteer in the Canadian Expeditionary Forces during the first World War, he was twice wounded and was decorated by King Albert of the Belgians, personally, for his courage under fire. Mr. Van Paassen has traveled in Germany, Italy, Soviet Russia and practically every country in Europe, Africa and the Near and Middle East. He has studied the Jewish problem in many places and is a well-known figure in the ghettos of Europe. He is one of the few non-Jews who is an honorary citizen of Tel-Aviv.

Hadassah Celebrates 30th Anniversary Of Local Chapter

Mrs. Julian Ansell, President New England Region of Hadassah, addressed the local chapter and guests at a dinner held at the Community Center, Tuesday, April 10th, in observance of the 30th anniversary of the Portland chapter. Covers were laid for nearly 200. Mrs. Ansell has under her jurisdiction sixty chapters with a membership of 11,000.

Mrs. Ansell urged her audience to "hitch their wagon to Miss Henrietta Szold's star" and continue the work of Hadassah, which she explained means "healing of my people." She traced the program from its modest beginnings in a disease-ridden and arid land until the gigantic program of Hadassah's Medical Organization has now gained world recognition and ever expands to meet the increasing demands made upon it. She made a stirring plea to the local chapter to play an intrinsic part in the erection of the new tuberculosis hospital which is Hadassah's latest project in Palestine, and for which there is such dire need at present. Hadassah's Youth Aliyah project, she stated, now embraces the care of 14,000 children who have found asylum in Palestine, and hordes are still awaiting entry when it can be arranged. The youth project was very near and dear to the heart of Hadassah's founder, Miss Henrietta Szold.

Mrs. Samuel Katze was Chairman for this event and also acted as Toastmistress, and also led in community singing with Mrs. David I. Rubinoft at the piano. Miss Shirley Spector rendered vocal selections, accompanied by her brother, David. Mrs. Leo Cohen, President, greeted the audience briefly, and Mrs. Elias Caplan outlined her early experiences as founder of the local chapter, under the personal direction of Miss Henrietta Szold. Golden Book Certificates for meritorious service the past year were awarded by Mrs. Mendell Silverman to Mrs. Samuel Katze, and on behalf of the local chapter, to Mrs. Leo Cohen, President. A Special Gift was presented to Mrs. Louis Gordon, who was largely responsible for the delectable repast.
