Rabbi Barnett R. Brickner, one of America's truly great Jewish spiritual leaders, who will be the guest of honor at the Second Anniversary Community Dinner of the Jewish Federaon Sunday evening, May 6th, at the Jewish Community Center.

Rabbi Brickner is identified with the leadership of every important Jewish national organization, and has served on the governing boards of numerous local and national institutions of government, civic, communal and cultural enterprises.

He is a noted lecturer whose radio addresses have made him one of the foremost speakers on the American platform.

Rabbi Barnett R. Brickner To Address Capacity Crowd At Center

A capacity gathering of Portland Jewry is expected to fill the Banquet Hall on Sunday evening, May 6th, at the Community Dinner of our Jewish Federation, when the distinguished Rabbi Barnett R. Brickner will be the principal speaker and guest of honor.

General Chairman George I. Lewis, whose campaign organization undertook the biggest job in Portland history, has announced that all who are contributing \$100 and over are entitled to make reservations. Because some reservations were not received, the Federation office will be pleased to accept last minute reservations on Saturday evening from those who failed to get one in the mail.

Jacob H. Berman will preside as Toastmaster of the evening, and all the guests who attend are assured that the usual lengthy "Banquet Speeches" will be decidedly absent.

A Salute To Capt. Arnold Potter

Two recent honors received by Arnold Potter, pilot of B-24 Liberator Bomber in Italy, were the Dis-tinguished Flying Cross and his promotion to Captain in the 15th AAF headquarters in Italy.

He received the award for "conspicuous and extraordinary achievement in aerial combat in consistent performance of vital strategic combat missions against enemy opposition of highly aggressive fighter aircraft and intense and accurate anti-aircraft fire." Although his plane was frequently damaged in encounters with the enemy, Potter consistently battled his way through to the target for the destruction of vitally important enemy installations, and brought his plane back to home base through severe and adverse weather conditions and rugged terrain. Mu Sigma Fraternity **Holds Memorial Service**


