The Marriage Ceremony

One of the happiest celebrations in a young persons life is that of his or her wedding day. Woven in are many ceremonies, some of which are seldom observed these days.

It is still customary that the Chasan—groom—be called up to a reading of a portion of the Law on the Sabbath preceding the appointed wedding day. Among the Orthodox the bride—Kalah—and groom fast on the day of their wedding till after the wedding ceremony.

The marriage takes place under a canopy or Chuppah in the presence of a Minyon and of two male witnesses not related to each other or to the bride or groom. The Chuppah is a square-like embroidered shawl, with the Mogen David in the center. At each corner it is attached to a wooden handle or pole. The Chasan and Kalah stand under the canopy separated from the rest of the gathered friends, symbolizing their unity

and the separation of both from the rest of the world. The chuppah is also a reminder of the ancient tent-life of Israel. In places where the chuppah is no longer accounted essential to the ceremony, often a floral canopy or arch is erected for beauty, and

Recipe

ORANGE TEA CAKES

Submitted by Mrs. Edward Stern

- 2 C. sifted flour
- 2 Tsp. b. powder
- 1/4 Tsp. salt
- 1 Tablespoon grated orange rind
- 2 Tablespoons shortening
- 1 C. sugar
- 1 Unbeaten egg ¹⁄₄ C. milk
- ½ C. orange juice

Sift flour with baking powder and salt. Add orange rind to shortening and beat well. Add sugar and cream thoroughly. Add egg and beat until light. Add flour, alternately with milk and orange juice.

Pour into greased cupcake pans, filling 2/3 full. Bake at 375 degrees for 20 min. Makes 12 large or 20 small cupcakes.

These cakes may be filled. Scoop out small piece from center of each cake and fill with orange filling. Then frost with butter frosting.

ORANGE FILLING

- 2 Tablespoons flour
- ¹/₄ C. sugar
- Salt
- ½ C. orange juice
- 1 Unbeaten egg yolk
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ Tbls. lemon juice
- 1 Tsp. grated orange rind
- 1 Tbls. butter

Combine flour, sugar and salt in top of double boiler. Add fruit juice, egg and mix. Place over rapidly boiling water and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Remove from boiling water, add butter and orange rind. Cool.

as a link with this old custom. The parents or other near relatives who accompany the bride and groom to the chuppah are called unterfuhrers (those who lead in).

After the proper wedding benedictions have been pronounced the Chasan puts a ring on the index finger of his Kalah's right hand

while pronouncing the following statement in Hebrew-"Thou art consecrated unto me by this ring according to the laws of Moses and Israel". Seven benedictions or blessings are recited, two of which are said over cups of wine out of which the bride and groom drink. The rabbi reads the marriage contract-Kesubah which describes the duties and obligations of both Chasan and Kalah, in its original Aramaic wording. The Chasan then steps on and breaks a glass. This is to remind those present of the destruction and ruin of the Temple and of the former glory and happiness of Israel.

The usage of a wedding ring to perform a ritual marriage has been customary since post-Talmudic days. Certain regulations were prescribed for the ring. It has to be a smooth plain ring of any metal but with no stones. In no case shall the wedding ring be set with diamonds, perhaps because the bride might be enticed into matrimony merely because of the jewels. If the young wife then is told later that she overestimated the value of the jewels, she may regret her being married. Such regret would annul the validity of the marriage.
