FROM THE RABBI



I would like to tell you about Rabbi Shimmy Green. Shimmy exudes warmth, love, enthusiasm, energy, passion, learning, poetry and music. When I knew him, and only through a few relatively brief encounters, he lived and taught in the "Rova"—the Jewish Quarter in the Old City of Jerusalem. Shimmy, by the way, is a common Yiddish nickname for Shimon/Simeon, much like Sruli is a Yiddish nickname for Yisrael/Israel.

One time, I found myself walking alone with Shimmy

alongside the massive outer walls of the Old City. It was a Friday night and the walls were lit with a soft orange glow. I was overwhelmed by the grandeur and beauty of the scene, and I shared my excitement with Shimmy. His response: "I hate these walls. I wish they would just tear them down." Even after 20 years, I can still taste the shock.

I trusted Shimmy enough to thoughtfully consider his words. Okay, the walls are not Jewish—they were not built by or for Jews. Still, there had to be more. Shimmy apparently felt that the walls were a distraction—that Jerusalem was not about its walls, towers, lights, or even history, but simply a place to feel God's presence most acutely. That Shimmy acutely felt God's presence was beyond question, and his enthusiasm for God was infectious.

Shimmy's Jerusalem was not one of light shows and fancy restaurants. Shimmy lived in a tiny apartment with his wife and six kids that was simply furnished. They ate simple food and wore simple clothes. The yeshiva (Talmudic Academy for young adult men) that he founded and taught at, consisted of one large simple room. Yet I can still feel the intensity—the explosion of Yiddishkeit—in his home and yeshiva. I am grateful to Shimmy not only for sharing his love of God and Torah with me but also for teaching me to look beyond the physical, to even ignore it, in order to make as much room as possible, in our overcrowded hearts and minds, for the spiritual.

While I have since diverged from Shimmy's (and my former) fundamentalist understanding of Judaism (for many reasons, not least because of its exclusion of women and rejection of gay people), I still frequently recall his warning to not let the physical overwhelm the spiritual. And, more importantly, to always practice Judaism with warmth, love, enthusiasm, energy, passion, learning, poetry and music!

Due to the generosity of our members, we have had two consecutive years where our dues and donations supported all of the Temple expenses. Prior to the last two years, it had been over 25 years since we had even one year that we did not have to dip into our investments to cover Temple expenses.



Our next book is a long one, so start reading *The Weight of Ink* by Rachel Kadish. Here is the write-up from amazon:

Set in London of the 1660s and of the early twenty-first century, *The Weight of Ink* is the interwoven tale of two women of remarkable intellect: Ester Velasquez, an emigrant from Amsterdam who is permitted to scribe for a blind rabbi, just before the plague hits the city; and Helen Watt, an ailing historian with a love of Jewish history.

When Helen is summoned by a former student to view a cache of newly discovered seventeenth-century Jewish documents, she enlists the help of Aaron Levy, an American graduate student as impatient as he is charming, and embarks on one last project: to determine the identity of the documents' scribe, the elusive "Aleph."

Electrifying and ambitious, *The Weight of Ink* is about women separated by centuries and the choices and sacrifices they must make in order to reconcile the life of the heart and mind.

Rachel Kadish will also be speaking at the JCA in Portland on May 21 at 7PM (\$10 donation suggested). I heard her talk last year in Newburyport at the Literary Festival and it made me want to read the book even though it has 592 pages! So read this readily available, 4.5 star book, come to Book Group on MONDAY, MAY 13 at 4 PM to discuss it, and then go hear Rachel Kadish give you all the inside scoop.
