AIPAC'S The Jordan Arms Package

SUMMARY

Despite some positive words, King Hussein is in fact moving away from direct negotiations with Israel. Instead, he is embracing the Soviet concept of an "international conference" at which radical Arab forces and the U.S.S.R. would play a decisive role. He is seeking a position acceptable to the PLO and Syria, rather than begin a dialogue about real peace with Israel.

The Jordan arms package is therefore unwarranted, because the King faces no "added element of risk" of conventional attack like he might face if he broke with the radicals and sought peace with Israel.

In fact, delivery of this package under current conditions would hurt the peace process rather than advancing it, for two reasons: (1) It would reward obduracy and send a signal that when Jordan sits tight the U.S. will come around to its point of view. This would be a disincentive for the King to take the next steps that are necessary for peace. (2) It will erode Israel's

margin of security, weakening the national unity government led by Shimon Peres and reducing its ability to take risks for peace. At the same time, it will add to the burdens on Israel's economy and force the Jewish state to choose between its economic health and its security.

The package threatens Israel because it builds the arsenal of Israel's closest neighbor, sharing its longest border. It increases the combined Arab capability to launch a surprise air attack, and might create an air defense umbrella under which the Arab ground forces can advance while being shielded from the Israeli Air Force (much as Syrian and Egyptian air defense played a key role in the combined surprise attack of October 6, 1973).

Jordan is not the most militant state in the Arab coalition, but it has participated in three past rounds of fighting against Israel. Its geographical proximity to Israel's heartland, and the high quality of its forces, give it an importance in the Arab

This will confirm to you that after receiving payment of the \$110,000, we received two additional payments, one in the amount of \$40,162.13 and the other for \$877.70. I enclose for your information copies of my letters to Mr. Kurr acknowledging receipt of these amounts.

As we wrote Mr. Kurr on October 8, 1984, we have recognized this bequest by

coalition out of proportion to its size.

Isarel cannot rely on Jordanian assurances to the U.S. that weapons supplied will not be used against Israel. In 1964, the U.S. supplied tanks to Jordan on the basis of such an assurance, but three years later Jordan violated the agreement and sent the tanks to the West Bank where they participated in the Six Day War. In 1973, U.S. weapons were sent with Jordanian troops to the Golan Heights, to support Syrian fighting against Israel.

While the Administration is describing the package as needed for Jordanian defense against Syria, Syria supports the sale of "the Jordanians, our brothers". Syria and Jordan are now engaged in a process of reconciliation, and historically have found it possible to cooperate against Israel on the battlefield even during periods when there were otherwise tensions between them.

SENATE ACTION

Your hard work helped ensure that 73 Senators have signed the non-binding Kennedy-Heinz Sense of Congress Resolution earlier this year. A new, binding Resolution of Disapproval, initiated by Senators Edward Kennedy (D-Ma) and John Heinz

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(R-PA), Robert Kasten (R-WI), Daniel Inouye (D-HI), Alan Cranston (D-CA) and Rudy Boschwitz (D-MN), is currently circulating in the Senate.

Please contact your Senators and ask them [1] To cosponsor the RESOLUTION OF DISAPPROVAL of the arms sale to Jordan, and [2] to vote FOR the resolution when it comes to the Senate floor. HOUSE ACTION

Similar action is taking place in the House. A **Resolution of Disapproval** initiated by Representatives Dante Fascell (D-FL), Larry Smith (D-FL), Vin Weber (R-MN), John McCain (R-AZ), William Gray (D-PA) and Mark Siljander (R-MI) is circulating there. AGAIN, IT IS CRUCIAL THAT YOUR REPRESENTATIVE SPONSOR THIS RESOLUTION OF DISAPPROVAL AND VOTE **FOR** IT WHEN IT COMES TO THE HOUSE FLOOR.

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
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Ethiopian Aliyah Fuels New Crisis



LOVE OF LEARNING SPEEDS ETHIOPIANS' ADJUSTMENT: A group of Ethiopian girls studies in the religious high school at Givat Washington in Israel. They are among 90 girls from Ethiopia at the rural agricultural kibbutz whose passion for learning is speeding their adjustment to their new home, Youth Aliyah officials say.

Part I

The ingathering of Ethiopan Jewry has posed a serious new challenge to Youth Aliyah facilities and programs and created an urgent need for additional funds to offset the cost of providing Ethiopian youngsters with basic human essentials.

Additional funds are required to complete furnishing of classrooms and dormitories and to purchase educational supplies for the Frieda S. Lewis Seminar Center at Hoshava in the Galilee.

The Hadassah National Board voted late last year to turn over the Center to Youth Aliyah for use as a temporary absorption facility for Ethiopian youth.

Earlier, the National Board authorized an emergency appropriation of an additional \$200,000 to Youth Aliyah over and above the \$2.3 million quota approved last

Youth Aliyah officials say a clearer picture of the young Ethiopian's personal and educational needs is emerging from hundreds of hours of interviews with mothers and children and their brief practical experience since the youths' arrival.

Teams of social workers have been talking with mothers and children in a special ward established in the Children's Department at Hadassah-Hebrew University Medical Center. Youth Aliyah also has screened thousands of older children as part of its routine admissions procedure.

The profile of Ethiopian Jewry that is developing from this information is of a proud, tradition-conscious yet enormously resourceful people with a deep love of learning.

Reform Movement Requests \$20 Million From Jewish Agency

New York, N.Y. - Five Reform organizations have requested \$20 million for the first year and a total of \$88 million over five years for Reform programs in Israel. Application was made to the Jewish Agency, which provides social and educational services to the Jewish State, and is supported largely by the United Jewish Appeal.

The historic application was submitted jointly by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, Hebrew Union College, the Central Conference of American Rabbis, the World Union for Progressive Judaism, and the Association of Reform Zionists of America. The project, which reflects the vast support that Reform Judaism renders the Iewish State, was coordinated and staffed by ARZA. Detailed funding requests for forty specific Reform programs in Israel were included. The programs fall into four categories: 1) Programs in Israel advancing Israeli Progressive Institutions, 2) Education programs in Israel for Diaspora Jewry, 3) Aliyah and absorption programs, and 4) Programs of Zionist education for the Diaspora. Precious Jewish Souls

It is erev Shabbat in Leningrad, and we-Jeffrey Ballon and myself, two American rabbis-are on our way to meet a family of refuseniks. We walk up several flights of stairs and knock on a door that has a mezuzza on its doorpost. A voice answers from within, and we say: "Shabbat Shalom. We are friends from America.'

The door opens, and we are welcomed by a woman in a bathrobe and escorted into the small living room-dining room which has already been converted into a bedroom. Two Shabbat candles flicker on the

Daniel Fradkin remains in bed. It is 13 years since he and Sara have been refused permission to leave, and he is depressed. Yet he eagerly shows us a book with the names of those who have visited him over the past 13 years, and he expresses the longing for more visitors. Sara soon returns, having put on her Shabbat dress, and brings out sweet cherries and wine. We are made to feel very much at home.

Now four lews sit and talk about life in Russia and about Jewish hopes and dreams, especially the yearning to be reunited with grandchildren who live far away. Suddenly, the lights go out. We, the visitors from America, jump. Is it the light of the two Shabbat candles. Soon one of them goes out as well, and now four Jewish souls converse by the light of only one flickering Shabbat candle.

The symbolism is awesome. The light that burns so dimly reminds us that Soviet Jews are reduced to the light of a single candle that struggles to stay lit. They look to the Jews of Israel and the Diaspora to help keep the flame alive, even as they look to the God of Israel for the light of redemption. How will we respond?

Rabbi Charles A. Kroloff, President of ARZA, noted that \$20 million is less than 5% of the Jewish Agency budget, which this year totals \$413 million. It is also substantially less than the Agency's present allocations to institutions and programs operated by Orthodox groups in Israel. Kroloff said that according to UJA figures, Orthodox programs are now allocated approximately \$30 million, which is 7.4% of the Agency budget, while institutions of the Reform and Conservative movements together receive 0.64% of the budget, which is less than \$3 million.

While individual Reform institutions have requested monty from the Agency in the past, this is the first time that a coordinated effort has been made by the entire Reform Movement. Rabbi Kroloff stated that there has recently been dissatisfaction in the Reform community over the low level of funding which the Agency has given to Reform projects in Israel. The grant application was prepared in response to that dissatisfaction, and to answer those Agency leaders who had pointed out that substantial funding had never before been requested. Rabbi Kroloff expressed confidence that greater Agency participation in the financing of Reform programs in Israel would deepen and strengthen the traditional support of Reform Jews for the United Jewish Appeal.

Rabbi Eric Yoffie, Executive Director of ARZA, said that Reform leaders fully expect the Conservative Movement to submit an application for funding, and that in fact they encourage it to do so. He pointed out that by most estimates, Reform and Conservative Jews provide 80% to 90% of Agency funds, and therefore it was not unreasonable that a larger percentage of the Agency budget should go to Reform and Conservative programs in Israel.
