DR. ABRAHAM A. NEUMAN TO OPEN CENTER CULTURAL SERIES

Dr. Abraham A. Neuman, president of Dropsie College and honorary rabbi of Congregation Mikveh Israel, will be presented to our community on Monday evening November 23rd.

"THE EMERGING PATTERN OF AMERICAN JEWRY" will be the subject of Dr. Neuman's address. Unlike other forecasters of the future of American Jewry, Dr. Neuman looks toward a rebirth of the Jewish genius on the American scene. Through a critical analysis of the present Jewish situation and his own positive feelings for a positive growth and development of the American Jewish community, Dr. Neuman presents an invigorating challenge to popular thought.

Graduating from Columbia University, he continued his studies and received his M. A. from his alma mater and his rabbinical degree from the Jewish Theological Seminary and also a Doctorate in Hebrew Letters. He is the author of numerous articles and books and recently completed Judaism in The Great Religions of the Modern Mr. and Mrs. Club World.

Dr. Neuman is the first program of the season to be presented by the adult activities committee of the Center and was made possible through the generous offer of Phil Lown. 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MILESTONES IN AMERICAN JEWISH HISTORY

1953/1954. Another program year for our organization, our Synagogues, our Center. But-a vastly different program year than the preceding ones.

1953/1954. A year in which the American Jewish community will celebrate two milestones in the history of Jewish development and growth. Three hundred years ago a hardy band of Jewish settlers set out from Brazil to seek a new home for themselves and their children. Three hundred years ago this same group landed in what is now the home of more than 2,000,000 Jews, New York. This year American Jewry is proudly celebrating the 300th anniversary of the first Jewish settlement in this country. The pages of American history are filled with the contributions that our people have made to the civilization which we call with pride "the American way of life."

1953/1954. One hundred years of service to our communities by the YMHA's, YWHA's and Jewish Community Centers. For it was 100 years ago that the first YMHA was established in Baltimore to assist the many new arrivals in their adjustment to the American scene. The growth of this movement has enveloped our entire nation. Small, medium and large communities have built or rented quarters to house the activities of the more than 400 Y's and Centers with a total membership of close to 1,000,000 persons.

1953/1954. A year in which we Jews of Bangor will join with all Jewish communities in celebrating these two milestones. A year in which our Council will take stock of its service to our community and plan ahead for the years to come, so that the gains made over the years may become solidified and the years ahead fruitful and rich in Jewish living.

Three hundred years of American Jewish history has been written and as the pen of time continues to record our contributions to Judaism and democracy our Center will continue to serve as an agency devoted to the fullest expression of living Judaism.


Dr. Ludwig Lewisohn, worldrenowned novelist, critic and thinker, will address the first ZOA breakfast on Sunday, December 6.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower will receive the 1953 America's Democratic Legacy Award of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith in Washington on November 23rd at a dinner given by the Board of Governors of B'nai B'rith to commemorate the League's 40th Anniversary. Philip M. Klutznick (left), president of B'nai B'rith, will preside at the dinner and the award will be presented to the President by Henry Edward Schultz (right), national chairman of the ADL, for his "distinguished contributions to the enrichment of America's democratic legacy", as the climax of a four-day forum program. The four major networks will televise the ceremony as part of a one-hour Rodgers and Hammerstein dramatization of the progress that America has made in the field of civil liberties during the past four decades. The President will be the ninth recipient of the medal (inset). Previous winners include former President Truman and Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt.

CHANUKAH-1953

Under Greek rule the Jews were enjoying freedom and general independence. It was only when Antiochus became King of Syria in the year 175 B.C.E. that they began to feel the yoke of the oppressor who tried to uproot their faith. It is indeed sad to record that Antiochus was helped by a group of extremist Jews who called themselves Hellenists and who did all in their power to influence the Jews of the country to exchange their life long tradition, for the socalled culture of the Greeks. But they had forgotten to reckon with the Hasmoneans, who though small in numbers, were strong in their conviction to fight for the right and the truth. Their religion's fervour and zeal gave them the strength to fight like lions, and so faith triumphed over alien influence and assimilation.

In our days a very similar problem faces our community. Whilst we of the Western world are allowed to learn, study and live according to our tradition and belief, many thousands of Jews in other lands have been deprived of this liberty, and are made to exchange their ways of life for other socalled cultures. It is up to us, therefore, to show the world that in our hearts.
