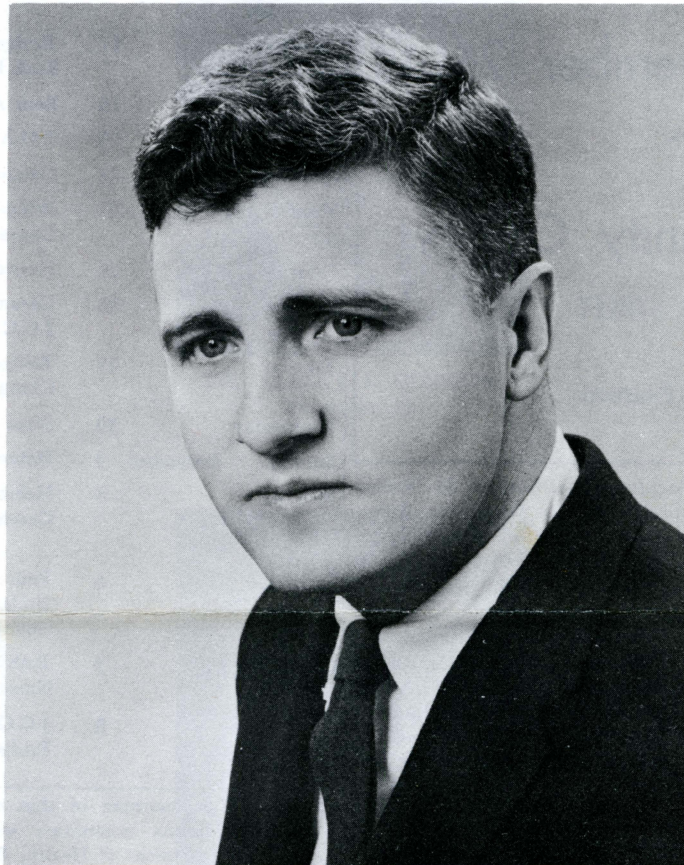

GORDAN D. HALL TO DISCUSS "WHO ARE THE ENEMIES OF THE U. N.?" IN OPENING CENTER FORUM



Gordon D. Hall will speak at the Center Sunday evening, November 13 at 8:30. Following his talk on "Who Are the Enemies of the U. N.," a discussion period will be held.

Mr. Hall was educated in the public school systems in Long Island, New York. He served in the United States Army Air Forces from 1942 until 1945 and graduated from a special Air Forces school in communications prior to leaving for overseas duty.

Since 1946, Mr. Hall has been a free lance writer, research student and consultant in the field of international relations and extremist group activity in the U. S. He maintains active and current files on extremist Communist groups and extremist hate movements presently dividing the U. S. A. along racial, religious and ethnic lines. Mr. Hall added lecturing to his activities in the year 1951.

His articles have appeared in such widely diverse publications as the *Harvard Business Review*, the *Christian Register* and journals of political and scholarly opinion. He has written and has had published "The Hate Campaign Against the United Nations" published in Boston by the Beacon Press, Inc. This study was formally endorsed by Mr. Warren R. Austin who served as United States Ambassador to the United Nations at the time the study was published.

Mr. Hall serves as a consultant to a number of nationally known organizations in the field of education, book publishing and religion. He is, for example, a consultant to the constituent bodies of the National Council of Churches of Christ and to the National Council which is the official Protestant Church Council in the U. S.

Added to these many accomplishments, Mr. Hall was recently a guest on Dave Garroway's "Today" program on television.

Sanford Solender Appointed To Top Executive Post In J. W. B.

NEW YORK:—The appointment of Sanford Solender as executive vice-president of the National Jewish Welfare Board (JWB) was announced this week by Solomon Litt, New York, JWB national president. Mr. Solender has been director of the JWB Jewish Community Center Division since the fall of 1948.



As professional head of the National Jewish Welfare Board, Mr. Solender will be responsible for the direction of JWB's services as the national association of YM-YWHAs and Jewish Community Centers, and as the government-authorized agency for religious, morale and welfare services to Jews in the U. S. Armed Forces and in Veterans Administration hospitals and to their dependents. He succeeds the late Samuel D. Gershovitz.

Mr. Solender was educated at New York University and at Columbia University. He came to JWB in 1948 as director of the organization's Bureau of Personnel and Training, and prior to that had been executive director of the Council Educational Alliance in Cleveland. A veteran in the social work field, he has held staff positions at a number of Jewish Community Centers.

Mr. Solender, who lives at 12 Mersereau Avenue, Mt. Vernon, is a past president of that city's Board of Education and this year won the Mt. Vernon Distinguished Citizen Award. He is active in numerous local and national organizations. He was chairman of the committee which developed the program for the merger of six national professional social work associations into the National Association of Social Workers, and

now serves as chairman of that organization's liaison committee with the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. He is a former president of the National Association of Jewish Center Workers, former vice-president of the National Conference of Social Work, and in 1958 won the Joseph E. Kapell award of the National Conference of Jewish Communal Service. He has written extensively for professional social work journals and has contributed to several volumes in the field.

He is a member of a family which is now in its third generation of service in the Jewish Community Center field. His father, the late Samuel Solender, was the pioneering executive director of the Washington Heights-Inwood YM-YWHA, and his son, Stephen, is currently a student at the New York School of Social Work. Mr. and Mrs. Solender, the former Ethel Klonick, have four children.

Center Membership At All Time High

The average annual growth of 13,600 in membership of Jewish Community Centers and YM-YWHAs recorded since 1948 was exceeded in 1958 when the gain was 14,000, bringing the total to 608,000, according to the newly-published Vol. IX of the JWB YEAR BOOK. The 1960 membership was estimated at nearly 650,000, according to the National Jewish Welfare Board (JWB), national association of Jewish Community Centers and YM-YWHAs.

The continued membership growth was attributed to the opening of new Center buildings resulting in membership gains in those Centers, and to improved Center programs and services and greater participation in Center activities. Another contributing factor was the trend toward family membership and away from individual membership. One out of every three Jewish Community Centers and YM-YWHAs affiliated with JWB now enrolls members only on a family basis because Centers are rapidly becoming family-oriented and providing more programming for the family unit and for every age group in the family.

An increase in the proportion of

self-support over community support was a significant change between 1957-1958, the JWB Year Book declares. Center revenue from membership dues and service fees rose by 10.5 percent between 1957 and 1958 while receipts from Jewish Welfare Funds and Federations and Community Chests and United Funds rose by 7.5 percent. In 1958 Centers secured an average of 57 percent of their income from internal sources compared with 55.7 percent in 1957 and 45.9 percent in 1956.

The increased income from dues was a reflection of higher membership fees instituted in newly opened Center buildings, greater emphasis on mandatory family membership plans and the enrollment of more members made possible by expanded and better located facilities.

The JWB Year Book reveals that the impact of inflation in earlier years of the 1948-59 period has been reversed in Center expenditures. "While perennially higher costs of manpower and materials contribute to the regular annual rise in operating expenditures," the JWB Year Book states, "program expansion has now become the primary influence on costs" in the wake of the opening of new buildings, establishment of new camps, nursery schools, older adult programs and health and physical education facilities.
