



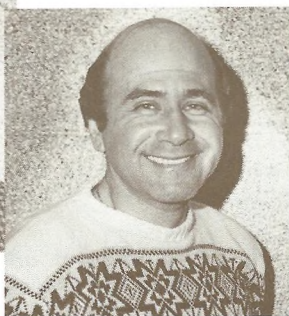

The major goal of the Federation is raising Jews. Yes, we do raise dollars, but if we don't raise the consciousness of the Jewish Community, everything else that we want to accomplish will not happen.

One of our tools is the annual campaign. That is primarily what we are about.

The key is our volunteers. The Federation and its family of agencies are built on the involvement of people.

We define involvement as the concern of one person for another. We are concerned with the qualitative survival of the Jewish people in Southern Maine and in other parts of the world — especially Israel.

We have a staff committed to this new direction. We will make a conscious effort to be more open — to inform and especially to involve more people.

Southern Maine has always been a great Jewish community. The potential for continued growth is boundless.

NOTES FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANFORD CUTLER

What counts in Jewish life is not so much what we profess to believe, but what we do about those beliefs.

No matter how individual Jews interpret the concept of "tsedakah" (righteousness and justice), for those involved in Federation work, the concept suggests that to aid one's fellow man is not an individual act, but a group responsibility.

Participation in this cooperative group activity is one of the most deeply rooted principles encompassed - by "tsedakah."

The measure of the quality of Southern Maine's Jewish community is the degree to which individual Jews are able to translate their beliefs into cooperative action with others toward a common purpose.

The idea of group activity within the Southern Maine Jewish community encompasses not only those activities related to the needs of Jews here, but also the needs of other Jewish communities throughout the world, particularly Israel.

This is a new level of interdependence. While Jews are responsible for each other within their local community, their communities are responsible for each other on the global level.

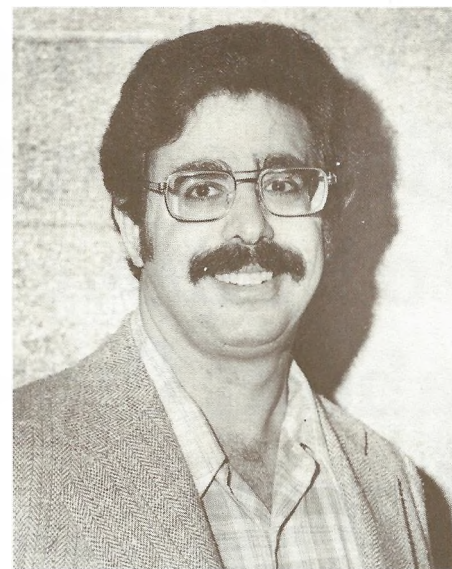
The key to the strength of this community, and all others, is the quality of our collective action through the Combined Jewish Appeal.

The crucial feature of this Federation is its ability to create and maintain a broad sense of unity around programs designed to meet local Jewish needs.

It is the most broadly based Jewish communal structure which attempts to transcend the numerous differences which characterize Jewish life — organizational, ideological and religious.

The Federation performs four basic functions related to the overall mission of involving Jews in common action:

- raising funds through the annual campaign.
- allocate funds to more than local programs, national agencies and the UJA
- plan and coordinate community action related to local needs
- develop and renew leadership

The Federation then is primarily responsible for enriching the quality of Jewish life in Southern Maine. This is the key to nurturing Judaism as well as meeting the needs of individual Jews.

The capacity for ensuring an involved and sharing community in Southern Maine belongs to those who become involved in the process. Without strength at home, we cannot lend support to others who need our help elsewhere in the world.

In order to provide continuity, the Federation leadership is beginning to ask three basic questions each time it is presented with new ideas or plans for the future, or evaluates current activities.

First, does this idea, solution or plan relate to the development of unity in the Southern Maine Jewish community?

Second, does it develop a commitment in younger members to participate in the work of being responsible Jewish citizens in the framework of this community?

Third, does it enrich Jewish life?

Can we continue to strengthen these basic dimensions of community life? This is the challenge before the Federation members and all those who wish to join this communal process.

Our search is for that unique and growing sense of "oneness" — oneness in this community; oneness with other communities, especially oneness with Israel.

At the root of this search for oneness is the desperate need for more knowledge of one another's beliefs and information on the ever-changing parameters of this community's needs.

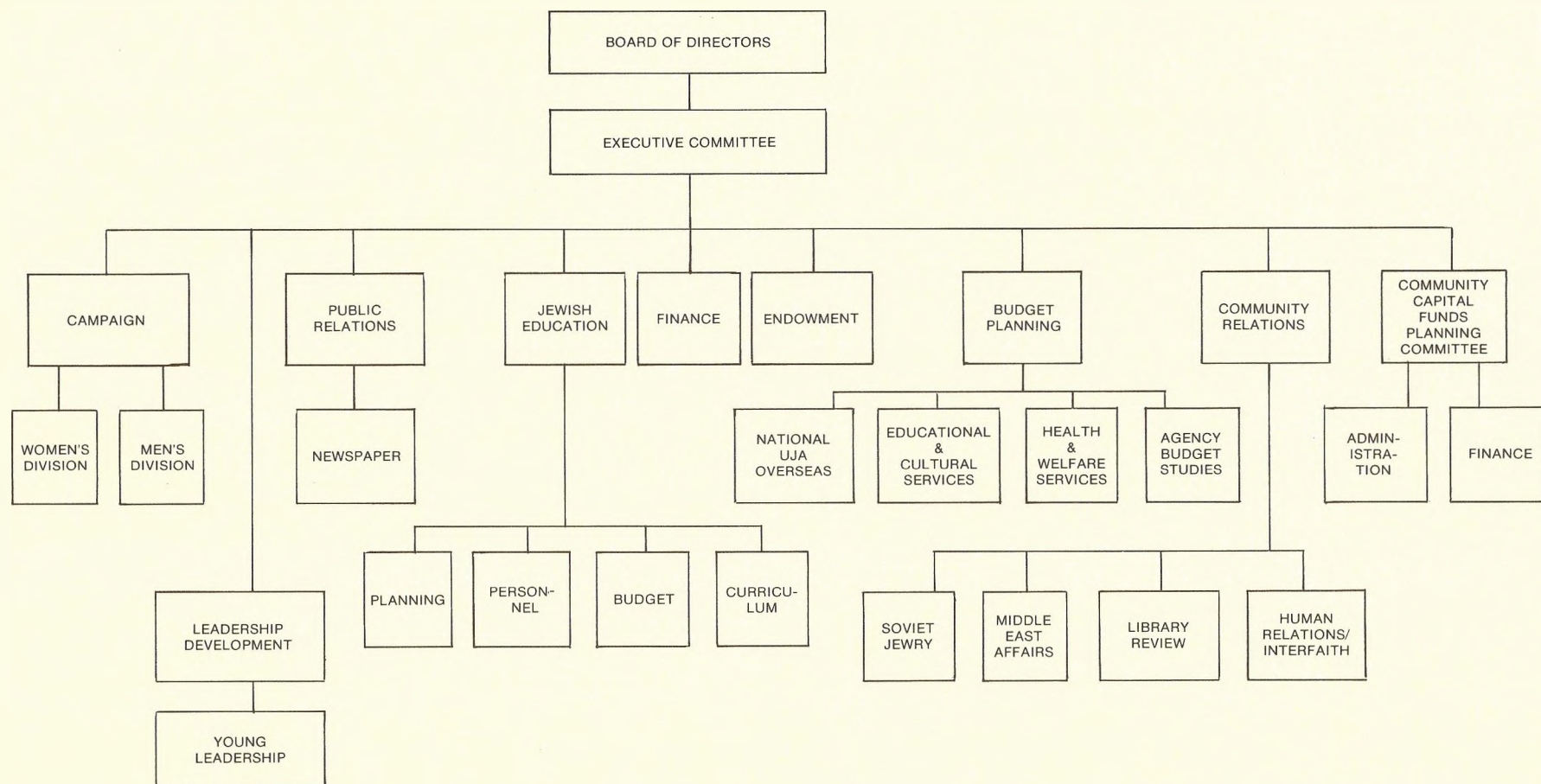
