FROM THE DESK OF RABBI DWORKEN:

The Holiday of Shavuoth which commemorates the giving of the Torah by God to the Israelites impresses upon us that Torah is the property of the entire household of Israel. It was revealed to all of the people at the same time. It was not given to Moses as his private possession, nor was it given to a special coterie or clique, but to each and every Jew at that time, and for all time.

By making the Torah communal property, God sought to teach us that for Judaism to be viable, the great mass of Jews must accept its teachings and live by its dictates. It is not enough to have an elite group live by its laws, we all must practice its concepts. There are pious and righteous men and women within ours and other Jewish communities, but it takes a great number, the vast majority, not minority of people to insure the preservation of Judaism as a way of life. The words of Torah must become known to all segments of our people and its ideals must inspire the great mass of our community.

I am constantly told at meetings or at people's homes (Jews of course) "Oh Rabbi, you can't eat that", and I respond, "In truth, you can't eat it either, but you do". Torah, its way of life, laws, customs and mores, apply equally to all of us--the only difference is that some of us have awakened and responded to our responsibilities as Jews, while most have not.

How about it? Awake from your slumber. It's never too late for you, your children, and grandchildren.
