Words of Torah from Rabbi Saks

In this week's Torah portion, Nitzavim, which we will revisit in less than two weeks' time on Yom Kippur, we read that God made the covenant not only with the Israelites standing at Mount Sinai, but also with all of those who were not there that day.

Our commentators vary on what this means. Some indicate that it refers specifically to those who, in that generation and future generations, would choose Judaism. Others say that it is about



whoever would choose to follow in the footsteps of the Israelites who were present that day. The explanation I like the most is that all future generations of the Jewish people were present, if only in spirit, when we entered into the covenant with God. The 18th century Ladino commentary, Me'am Lo'ez, which came out of the Ottoman Empire, asks how future generations can enter into the covenant if they were not yet alive. The answer is found in our Passover Haggadah, where we read that if God had not redeemed us from Egypt, our children and our children's children would have still been slaves in Egypt. Future generations are able to enter into the covenant, even though not physically present, because others laid the foundation.

As we enter this unprecedented High Holy Day season, let us draw from this moment in our story. Our story tells us that it is not our physical presence that connects us with God and each other, but rather our claiming our place at Mount Sinai and accepting the legacy of Judaism that has been passed down to us.

Tel Gezer: Where Bible meets history and archeology Sunday, September 13, 12:30 PM

Last month, our friend and Israeli tour guide Yoram Preminger took us up the *tel* (mound or hill) to see the top of Hiriya Park. This month he guides us from one *tel* to another to Tel Gezer. Today it looks totally desolate, but over 3,000 years ago, Gezer was a major Canaanite



center. It was situated on an extremely strategic spot, above a coastal byway that served traders, warriors, and travelers for thousands of years. King Solomon rebuilt it and turned it into one of his main fortified cities. Archaeologists have been uncovering its turbulent history ever since.

Maine's online system for applying for an absentee ballot for the November election is now available. Any Maine registered voter can choose to vote absentee, either by mail or in person. But to receive a ballot by mail, you must fill out the online request form. Once you have voted, you may choose to mail in your ballot, return it to your city clerk or town hall prior to or on election day, or take it to your polling place on election day.
