Words of Torah from Rabbi Saks

The penultimate plague of the ten described in this week's portion, *Bo*, and last week's, *Va-eira*; it is darkness. When we recall the plagues at the Passover Seder, we often recall this one as not being able to see, perhaps by putting on dark sunglasses or even a blindfold. But the darkness that fell on Egypt just before the Israelites' escape was far darker than anything we can create. The text tells us that the darkness could be touched (Ex. 10:20). Ibn Ezra, the 12th century Spanish commentator, teaches that it wasn't



simply that light was diminished, as with sunglasses, or removed, as with a blindfold. Darkness actually fell, a darkness as thick as fog, so dark that the Egyptians could literally feel it. Once the darkness falls, the people cannot see each other or even get up because the darkness is so thick.

We focus on Pharaoh's behavior and his unwillingness to release the Israelites, but this plague reminds us that the Egyptian people were blind to the Israelites' suffering. In this moment, we hear the prophet Isaiah's call to be a light to the nations, and we hear inaugural poet Amanda Gorman's call, "There is always light if only we are brave enough to see it. There is always light if only we are brave enough to be it."



Sophia Gavin Bat Mitzvah Project

For my Bat Mitzvah project, I researched period poverty, and by talking about it, you are erasing a little bit of the stigma around it. I also decided to create a fundraiser to raise money for purchasing period products. Period poverty affects one in four women, and can lead to women and girls missing school and work. This means that they are given less education because of something so normal as a period. At my school, I did a presentation talking about why period poverty is bad and why we need to fix it. My goal is to raise awareness and to also provide women with period products through the Michael Klahr Jewish Family Services food pantry. I am raising awareness, products, and funds so that we can make a bigger difference in our world.
