Words of Torah from Rabbi Saks

Parashat Yitro, this week's Torah portion, is one of two that contain the Ten Commandments. (They are reiterated, in a slightly different form, in Parashat Va-et'chanan in the book of Deuteronomy.) Contrary to popular belief, the Ten Commandments are not God's top ten list, not the most important of the 613 commandments of Judaism. They are just the tip of the iceberg and the introduction to observing the mitzvot that the Israelites receive in the wilderness. With this in mind, we have to wonder why these ten? Why not any



of the other 603? Why isn't, "Love your neighbor," on this list? How come, "Be kind to the stranger?" or "Love the Eternal your God?" are not included? The Ten Commandments give us insight into the two overarching relationships that when done well make life rich: relationships with others and relationship with God. The first four of the ten (I am Adonai your God, have no idols, do not use God's name in vain, keep Shabbat) guide us in our relationship with God. The last five (no murder, no adultery, no stealing, no bearing false witness, and no coveting) guide our relationships with other people. It is the fifth of these Ten Commandments that bridges the gap: honor your parents. Whether it our biological parents, the ones who raised us, or the symbolic ancestors who preceded us, the honor we bestow upon our ancestors, real and symbolic, can be an indicator of the relationships that we have with others and with God. It's important to note, though, that the text does not tell us we have to love our parents. It does not demand a good relationship with them. Torah knows that these may not be possible. But it does ask us to bestow honor upon them and to honor them with the people we are, even when the people they were can sometimes make that task more challenging.
