Words of Torah from Rabbi Saks

A great deal of text from this week's Torah portion, *T'tzaveh*, deals with the ritual clothing that Aaron, the High Priest, will wear, detailing the fabrics, the decorative stones, and so much more. Among the instructions is the requirement to place two stones on the shoulder straps of the *ephod* (a sacred vest worn by the High Priest). These two stones serve as a remembrance for the children of Israel so that Aaron would carry their names on his shoulders whenever he stood before God. According to *Me'am Lo'ez*, the 18th



century Ladino commentary, these stones were there both to remind God of the merits of Jacob's sons (Jacob was also known by the name Israel.) who were the first ones to unify God's name. This would remind God to be forgiving with the Israelites based upon the merit of their ancestors. The stones would also remind the Israelites of those who came before them and their merits, encouraging them to emulate their ancestors. Rabbi Chaim ben Solomon of Czernowitz in his text *Be'er Mayim Chaim* teaches that Aaron literally carried the Israelites on his shoulders, like a person who carries a child on his shoulders to save him or her from danger. This imagery compels us to lift others up, to carry them through difficult situations, and to elevate their accomplishments for all to emulate.

They Ain't Ready for Me - "The story of Tamar Manasseh, an African American rabbinical student, who has led the fight against gun violence in her Southside Chicago neighborhood. A fascinating look at the complex identity and motivations of an extraordinary person who is Jewish and black, and how these intersecting identities offer her a road map for addressing one of America's most urgent crises."

Rosenwald - "The story of Julius Rosenwald, the son of an immigrant peddler, who rose to head Sears, and partnered with Booker T. Washington and African American communities to build 5,400 Southern schools in African American communities in the early 1900s during the Jim Crow era. 
