Words of Torah from Rabbi Saks

Our Torah reading for this Shabbat falls outside of the regular cycle of Torah readings. It is taken from *Parashat B'Shalach* in the book of Exodus and, notably, includes *Shirat HaYam*, the Song at the Sea, which the Israelites sang upon reaching the far shore of the Sea of Reeds safely. Most of the song is Moses' but the last two verses, Exodus 15:20-21, allude to Miriam's song. Tradition tells us that the one verse of Miriam's song that appears in the text is just a fragment of the song in which she led the women. The text



identifies her as *Miriam HaN'viah*, *achot Aharon*, Miriam the Prophet, sister of Aaron. Commentators have wondered why she is referred to here as Aaron's sister and not as Moses'. Rashi, the renowned 11th century French commentator, points out that Miriam's prophecy began before Moses was born. It was she, according to the Talmud (Sotah 12b), who prophesied that her mother would bear a son who would deliver the Israelites from Egyptian bondage. When Pharaoh issued the decree to have all Hebrew baby boys cast into the Nile, her father divorced her mother and decided that no more children should be born, lest any of them die. Miriam scolded her father saying that his decree was worse than Pharaoh's. Pharaoh only intended to kill the boys, but her father would prevent any children from being born. Upon hearing this, her father remarried her mother and then they had Moses. While their stories are not often recounted in our texts, the women in our tradition have often been the ones who have led us toward redemption, many following in Miriam's footsteps.


