Words of Torah from Rabbi Saks

Commentary on the death of Aaron's sons, Nadav and Abihu, in this week's Torah portion, Sh'mini, often leave me feeling unfulfilled. The text tells us that Nadav and Abihu, priests in their own right, sons of the High Priest, Aaron, offered alien fire, not commanded by God, on the altar. Their act results in their sudden death, being struck down with fire from heaven by God. The Torah tells us that after their death, their father Aaron falls silent. The rabbis wrestle with the character of these two men and their father's reaction.



Four times, Torah mentions the deaths of Nadav and Abihu and each time mentions the strange fire they offered, but makes no other judgment on their character. It seems that aside from this one misstep, the two are considered righteous. Moses attempts to comfort his brother by indicating that God has said, "Through those near to Me I show Myself holy, and gain glory before all the people" (Lev. 10:3). In one midrash (rabbinic legend), Moses offers comfort to his brother by telling him that it was specifically through his sons' death that the Mishkan, the portable wilderness sanctuary was made holy, not unlike the relics of saints in the Catholic tradition that add to the holiness of particular places. Some commentators say that when Aaron falls silent, it is his acceptance of the divine decree. For me, this interpretation is hardly satisfactory. How could Aaron be comforted by knowing that the Mishkan was holier because of his sons' deaths? That interpretation fits well with the philosophy that everything happens for a reason, a philosophy that has rarely worked for me.

There are many things that befall us that seem to be without reason, whose higher purpose I cannot find. Instead, it seems to me that Aaron is dumbfounded by the death of his sons. He is incapable of offering any response, which is why he falls silent. He does not accept what has happened; he simply cannot muster words to react to it. Rabbi Harold Kushner, author of When Bad Things Happen to Good People, guides us by saying that we cannot answer the question of why bad things happen to good people, but we can ask ourselves, "What do I do when bad things happen to good people?" The challenge before Aaron – and before us – is to figure out how to move forward, even when the world seems unjust and unfair. It is in our response to the situation that we might find comfort and might find God.



Solar Energy Fundraiser

Support Local Maine Solar, Lower Your CMP Bill and Raise Money for Bet Ha'am

Bet Ha'am was recently contacted about a new fundraising initiative involving congregants who may be interested in community solar. PowerMarket is an operator of multiple community solar energy farms on the east coast including one located in Baldwin, Maine that is currently looking for "subscribers." Subscribers are self-designated CMP customers who wish to buy a portion of their electricity from a



community solar farm. The electricity is sold at a discount and produced with a lower carbon footprint.

The initiative presented provides that PowerMarket and Darrell Cooper of Energy Audits Ltd. will donate \$150 to Bet Ha'am for each subscriber who signs up using the promo code "Bet Ha'am." There is no upfront cost to sign up, subscribers typically save about 10% on their CMP bill, and they can cancel at any time on 60 days' notice.
