The Board of Trustees is inviting all synagogue members to one of two listening sessions. This is an opportunity for you to tell the board how you think we should address our ongoing budget



deficits, what membership at Bet Ha'am should include, what you hope will not change, and to respond to some of the ideas that have already been raised. Everything is on the table. It is important that we get input from a large number of congregants before we make changes to our current financial model.

Words of Torah

Rabbi Saks is away for a three-month sabbatical. While he is away, we will be sharing Words of Torah from various Jewish educational resources.

This week's Torah reading, *B'haalot'cha*, takes place just a few days journey from Mount Sinai; already the Israelites are "complaining bitterly" before God about food. "If only we had meat to eat! We remember the fish that we used to eat free in Egypt, the



cucumbers, the melons, the leeks, the onions, and the garlic. Now our gullets are shriveled. There is nothing at all! Nothing but this manna to look to!" (Numbers 11:4-6). God's response is to provide an overabundance of meat to the Israelites "until it comes out of your nostrils and becomes loathsome to you. For you have rejected the

Eternal who is among you, by whining before God and saying, 'Oh, why did we ever leave Egypt!''' (Numbers 11:20).

The following edited commentary was written by Rabbi Phyllis Sommer:

...God's response can be, for us, a reminder that gratitude must be taught and reinforced. Sure, the Israelites were acting fairly rebellious and whiny. But think about their previous situation: their Egyptian overlords would give them only what was necessary to keep them alive and working. There was no "gifting" and no "loving" and no "relationshipbuilding." These things take time to adapt to and to understand. The Israelites weren't quite ready to understand the beauty of God's gift, and God isn't ready to teach them about the value of gratitude. Much like children who need a prompt to say, "thank you," so too do the Israelites need to learn not only to say the words, but also to experience the feeling of gratitude.

There's a story about Rabbi Israel Salanter, the founder of the *Mussar* movement, who inquires as to why a cup of coffee in a restaurant is so expensive. He is reminded by the owner that while coffee is, in fact, merely beans and water, the experience of drinking the coffee in the restaurant with its fine linen, delightful ambiance, and excellent service is worth the money. Rabbi Salanter expands this idea to teach a better understanding of gratitude for something as simple as water; we are not grateful only for the creation of water but for the air that helps us to breathe as we drink the water, the way the water flows into the vessel, and even the singing of the birds as we drink the water - all of this is included in our gratitude for something as ubiquitous as water.¹

The Israelites still see the manna as merely a means of nourishment provided to them by a source with whom they don't yet have a long history of a loving relationship. They aren't quite ready, unlike Rabbi Salanter, to see the deeper message in the gift of the manna. Eventually, they will get there. Just like our children who need to be reminded, "what do you say?" Reading over this story of childish ungratefulness only serves to show us just how very far we have come, and of course, how very far we can continue to grow.

In-Person Worship Resumes!

In-person Shabbat services in our sanctuary have begun! There are a number of safety protocols in place, including,

Solar Energy Fundraiser

Support Local Maine Solar, Lower Your CMP Bill and Raise Money for Bet Ha'am

Bet Ha'am was recently contacted about a new fundraising initiative involving congregants who may be interested in community solar. PowerMarket is an operator of multiple community solar energy farms on the east coast including one located in Baldwin, Maine that is currently looking for "subscribers." Subscribers are self-designated CMP customers who wish to buy a portion of their electricity from a community solar farm. The electricity is sold at a discount and produced with a lower carbon footprint.



The initiative presented provides that PowerMarket and Darrell Cooper of Energy Audits Ltd. will donate \$150 to Bet Ha'am for each subscriber who signs up using the promo code "Bet Ha'am." There is no upfront cost to sign up, subscribers typically save about 10% on their CMP bill, and they can cancel at any time on 60 days' notice.

WTS is a grassroots project matching mentors with asylum seekers to help them integrate into the Greater Portland community. Bet Haam members have participated in this cross cultural friendship and partnership since its inception in 2016.

Mentors may provide a wide range of support through information, referrals, connections . This support may relate to transportation, housing, employment, education, English, culture, and more. Mentors are not expected to be Social Workers!

Along with knowing they are helping asylum seekers navigate a new community, mentors comment on the mutual benefits of cross cultural sharing and how mentees appreciate regular contact with someone who cares.
