A Message from Rabbi Saks

As I write this, the last full moon of summer is beginning to wane. As it rose last night, I caught sight of its deep redorange hue on my way home from Bet Ha'am. Throughout the rest of the year, catching sight of the moon at such a stage would have caught my attention but would not have given me reason to pause. At this time of the year, there is

an added layer of meaning. By the time you read this, the new moon that marked the beginning of the Hebrew month of *Elul* will have come and gone, and the moon will be growing back towards its fullness. At this time of year, watching the cycle of the moon reminds me of the approaching holidays and of my preparation for Rosh Hashanah, when the moon will disappear once again.

There is, of course, the technical preparation, which this year, being my first year as rabbi at Bet Ha'am, takes a great deal of time and

attention. It is learning the melodies that we will sing together. It is becoming comfortable with the schedule. When are Children's Services? When does the wall come down and go up? It is getting to know the many ways you, the members of Bet Ha'am, make the holidays come to fruition. It is considering sermon and study topics. I relish this type of preparation, not only because it gives me a sense that I have dotted every 'i' and crossed every 't,' but also because it connects me to the individuals who make Bet Ha'am a thriving congregation.

There is also the spiritual preparation, a preparation that looks different for me every year. While I am confident that our worship together will go wonderfully, I am not always confident that I will be as spiritually ready to get where I need to be in time for Rosh Hashanah. Where have I fallen short over the past year? Whom have I hurt? How can I be a better person? This is the more challenging preparation, the one that takes real conviction and dedication. This is the preparation that can seem insurmountable and unachievable.

As I noticed the moon, shy of full, last night, it more than caught my attention. It gave me reason to stop and reflect and evaluate my spiritual preparation for the High Holy Days. Will I be ready?

I am comforted by a passage in *Pesikta Rabbati*, a collection of *midrash*, rabbinic legends, from the 9th century. The *midrash* asks us to remember the story of a prince who was far away from his father, at least a hundred days' journey away. When the prince's friends told him that it was time for him to return home, he replied, "There is no

way that I can do that. I don't have the strength." When his father heard about his son's response, the king sent word to his son saying, "Come back as far as your strength will allow you, and I will go the rest of the way to meet you there."

The *midrash* explains that these are God's words to us during the month of *Elul* as we prepare ourselves for the arrival of Rosh Hashanah. Perhaps we don't think that we have the strength to get all the way back, but God reminds us, "Shuvu eilai v'ashuvah." ("Return to

Me and I will return to you.") (Malachai 3:7). God is prepared to meet us, not just half way, but wherever we are, as long as we begin the journey.

But I don't think this *midrash* is only about God's willingness to meet us on our journey. It is also about our relationships with one another and the potential for return. Sometimes we find ourselves in the shoes of the prince and are not strong enough to do all of the work, so we rely upon the gentle words of friends to encourage us and upon the kindness of others to meet us where we are. Sometimes we discover that we are like the king, eager to reconnect and hoping others will take the step they need to take. And sometimes we are the friends who can recognize the pain that others experience and guide them along the path, perhaps one we've walked ourselves.

As we come together for the High Holy Days at the end of this month, I hope you will begin the journey and walk with me. We will begin in the darkness of the new moon, making our way together toward the light of the full moon of *Tishrei*, celebration of *Sukkot* and our bounty together. As we prepare to enter the new year, may we find the strength, alone and together, to return to one another and to God.

A Recipe for Community

As I write this piece, we are on a whirlwind tour of Bet Ha'am neighborhood homes, and, along with Rabbi Saks, I am thoroughly enjoying meeting and greeting many of our congregants.

Although getting to know our new rabbi has been the focus of these neighborhood gatherings, it has been just as interesting to see Bet Ha'am friends old and new connecting with each other. I have had wonderful conversations with many of you and gotten to know a little bit more about what interests you and what each of you brings to the table. I was struck, in particular, by a delightful interaction between two long-term members – each of

whom I know pretty well. I never knew that they didn't know each other and was surprised because they seem to be such an obvious pairing. It occurred to me that our congregation still has some cooking to do to create an even stronger community.

I learned to cook from both my mom and my dad. My mom can make anything and will try any recipe. She taught me that if you carefully measure the right ingredients and follow the instructions to the letter, sometimes it really will look just like the picture in the magazine. My dad, on the other hand, brings to the kitchen mostly a passion for different flavors and great enthusiasm. Measuring cups and rules rarely enter the picture. My dad taught me that you rarely achieve anything extraordinary without taking a risk, and that, when all else fails, eggs can go on top of anything.

Both approaches are important as we consider our recipe for community. We've got the basic ingredients: a wise rabbi who shares our values and will be our guide and partner going forward, a beautiful place to worship and gather that can house our entire family, and a diverse collection of congregants who want to make a meaningful connection with Jewish life.

The recipe we have been following says: provide weekly services, a comprehensive religious school program, ample opportunities for adult learning, an environment for social action, and regular events that bring people together. That is enough to cook up a pretty good synagogue community. But if we want to reach a little higher, we can be

extraordinary. What might happen if we consider the individual flavors of each congregant and what each of us can add to the mix? What would happen if we shake things up and try new things together?

I've heard two comments this week about creating

community that gave me pause. One was from a member who joined a few years ago and still does not feel quite connected to Bet Ha'am. And the other was from a founding member who noted that many of us sit in the same places at every service. Both of those comments reflect old recipes that we may have grown too accustomed to. It's easy to forget to look around to see who is there. And, if you are shy or feel ill at ease, it's not easy to approach someone new.

I present this challenge to myself and to you as we enter into this new year and phase of renewal in the life of our congregation: find someone unfamiliar to talk with each time you visit Bet Ha'am. Take the time to ask an extra question and to find out what is important to them. Think about who you know that the person might enjoy meeting and help foster a connection. I think we would all enjoy the results of this new recipe.

I wish you and your families a *Shanah Tovah*, a happy and healthy new year filled with good friends and delicious combinations.

From the Religious School Director

A message from Orly Mendelson Biggie

The first day of our 5772 Religious School will be **Sunday**, **September 18**. As has been our *minhag* (custom), we will schedule parents' meetings during the first three Sundays. These meetings provide an opportunity to get to know other parents in your child's class, to hear about this year's programs, to look over textbook and class resources, and to find out how you can be more involved in Religious School and synagogue. The schedule of meetings is in the Religious School News article and on the school calendar you received. I hope to see all of you at these meetings.

The theme for this year's morning Religious School is Midot. The Hebrew word midot comes from the verb madad (to measure) and has a number of different meanings. Rabbis use this term to describe peoples' personalities, temperaments, and characteristics. Midot also refers to a collection of virtues that is intended to provide moral guidance for people in their daily lives. Throughout the year, we will explore different midot during class time, assemblies and study sessions. Some of these midot will be derekh eretz (common decency), hachnasat orcheem (hospitality), and kavod (honor).

We welcome Rabbi Saks to religious school! Rabbi Saks will lead our students and parents in study throughout the year.

I am looking forward to a great year. I wish you all *Shana Tova* - a happy and sweet year!

The Adult Education Committee, with help from Rabbi Saks, is excited to announce the following classes. More classes and learning opportunities will be offered after Sukkot. Watch for announcements in the weekly email.

1. Classes about the *Tishrei* holidays taught by Rabbi Saks in our Adult Education classroom:

Wednesday, September 14, 7:00-8:30 PM:

The High Holy Days are a time for soul searching and performing t'shuva (repentance and forgiveness). We will explore the themes of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur and prepare ourselves for the beginning of the new year. This class is designed for people who have experienced the High Holy Days as well as those new to these traditions.

Wednesday, September 21, 7:00-8:30 PM:

The holidays during the Jewish month of *Tishrei* continue with *Sukkot*, our fall harvest festival, and *Simchat Torah*, when we start reading from the beginning of the Torah with *B'reishit* (Genesis) again. These holidays are filled with celebration and joy. This class will help us find new meaning in the observances and customs associated with these holidays.

2. Come join us for classes on Sunday Mornings!

Two adult classes will be offered on Sunday mornings this fall. We hope this time will be convenient for both Religious School parents and others. **Jewish Values:** We will have ongoing discussions of *midot*, Jewish values, which will also be the theme for Religious School this year. After reading a short story or passage, we will discuss the values in the story and how to make them part of our lives with our families. The values we discuss will parallel those taught in Religious School.

Basic Hebrew Reading: Would you like to be able to help your child learn Hebrew but do not know the language? Do you wish you could read the prayers in Hebrew instead of the transliteration? If so, then join us! We will progress from the aleph-bet (alphabet) to reading from the siddur (prayer book). This class will be offered only if there is interest, so please contact the office or Lynn Urbach (lurbach1@maine.rr.com) if you would like to participate.

3. Melton Class: A new session of this extremely popular course will start in October. The text-based classes were developed at Hebrew University, and there is no homework. Survey Shows Bet Ha'am Members Value Social Action

Earlier this year, the Bet Ha'am Social Action Committee developed a survey to help us determine our direction, as well as projects and activities for the coming year and into the future. The survey was available to the congregation on-line and in hard copy throughout the spring of 2011.

Nearly 60 people completed the survey. The Committee was impressed by the strong interest in social justice issues that was apparent in the responses and by the desire to more fully integrate social action into services, Religious School and other contexts. Many of the people who completed the survey are already involved in social action activities; the Committee sees its challenge as getting more people to participate in social action activities within a Jewish context as part of Bet Ha'am.

Major issues identified for future projects include poverty in Maine, marriaae equality, and immigrant and civil rights. Survey responses reflected a strong interest in partnering with other organizations. Examples miaht be workina LearningWorks or Portland Adult Education on refugee issues, Interfaith Power and Light on energy issues and/or the National Council of Jewish Women on its Darfur project. The survey suggested interest in having speakers about current events at services.

The Committee is working with Rabbi Saks on plans for a series of speakers and activities related to immigrant issues in Maine. The series will kick off in the fall with a program about immigrants' educational

needs and how Bet Ha'am members can get involved. We also will hold a book drive to provide books for the free bookshelf at Portland Adult Education. Stay tuned for more details.

The Committee also discussed marriage equality. The referendum drive to put marriage equality on the ballot in 2012 will focus attention on this issue. We are checking into how the congregation can be most helpful.

Bet Ha'am Building Complex Wins Awards

Our building complex, both the renovated and new work, has received three notable distinctions for design excellence over this past year. This is a wonderful reflection on our congregation's vision in designing and building a religious house of the people that will adapt to our needs for generations to come!

One of the most prestigious architectural scholars, Kenneth Frampton, chose our building as a Current and Significant Building in America (from Mexico to Canada!), which was presented by our architects, Brigitte Shim and Howard Sutcliffe, at The Columbia University Symposium for American Architecture.

Our building complex was also selected as one of the most significant modern institutional projects built in Maine over the past 50 years. Bet Ha'am is one of four institutional buildings to receive this recognition.

And, most recently, a design jury for the international magazine, *Faith and Form*, and the Interfaith Forum on Religion, Art and Architecture at Duke University awarded our building Merit Distinction for Religious Architecture.
