## A Message from Rabbi Saks

I spent my final summer in college studying abroad in Costa Rica. Before heading to Costa Rica, I learned that San Jose had a small Reform congregation that had been in existence for about thirteen years. As I was settling into life with my host mother, Noemi, I asked for her assistance in locating the synagogue. The only contact information I had was a post office box address. As a Jehovah's Witness, Noemi understood what it meant to be a religious minority in a Catholic country and got to work trying to locate the Reform congregation for me. She called the only Jewish woman she knew, a member of San Jose's Orthodox congregation, who told Noemi to send me to the Orthodox synagogue instead, because the Reform synagogue wasn't real Judaism. I remember Noemi's reaction and can still hear her voice saying, "There are so few Jews in the world. Why can't you all get along?"

Noemi had a great point. Within our tradition is the notion of *k'lal Yisrael*, the wholeness of the Jewish community. The rabbis teach us *kol Yisrael arevim zeh ba-zeh*, the entire Jewish community is responsible for one another. Still, it often seems that we face conflict within the Jewish community. We disagree about



which movement's practice is more legitimate or more relevant.

When we don't see eye to eye, it damages the entire Jewish community. While our ritual differences and varying levels of observance can sometimes serve as obstacles in our relationships with members of different branches of the Jewish community, these differences can also serve as opportunities for dialogue and for strengthening the

Jewish community. I was recently approached by Rabbi Carolyn Braun of Temple Beth El and Rabbi Akiva Herzfeld of Congregation Shaarey Tphiloh after a member of the Jewish community expressed interest in a community *minyan* or weekday worship service. We quickly realized that the differences in our communities' religious practices may serve as barriers to such an endeavor. In order to explore the possibility, we felt we would need to start by talking about the similarities and differences. We reached out to Gary Berenson of Etz Chaim Synagogue and Rabbi Moshe Wilansky of Chabad to plan a community dialogue around issues on which our communities may not always see eye to eye.

Our program, *Eat, Pray, Love: A Community Conversation around Food, Worship, and Sex & Sexuality*, will be held in April and May in various locations in the

Jewish community. I will join the other spiritual leaders of our community's congregations in an open and honest dialogue about our personal beliefs and our community's understandings on these issues, helping to model civil discourse in an effort to create a greater sense of *k'lal Yisrael*, the wholeness of the Jewish community. I hope you will join us:

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## President's Message - Lisa Pierce

As I'm writing this, Passover is fast approaching. I have been spending a lot of time this week reworking our family's *Haggadah* in preparation. Over the past several years, we've used more or less the same version I threw together when our kids were small. This year, I realized rather belatedly that most of the kids who will be at my house are in high school and can handle a little more depth.

Never one to do things halfway, I've found myself taking a Reform approach – learning about different parts of the seder by consulting a variety of sources online, in print, and in person, and then choosing or crafting the words that make the most sense to me. What I've found in my travels is fascinating. Within this most ritualized of all Jewish festivals, there is a vast range of practice. Traditional voices say with certainty that each part of the seder must happen in a particular way. But everywhere I turn, others have tweaked, modified, added and turned tradition on its head – and with such a reverence for the underlying essence of it all that at times even the craziest things seem to sing with the resonance of history.

It's been liberating to me as I weed through the voices in my head that wonder, "Will this kid find meaning in that text?" and "What will the grandparents think if we do this instead?" and "Can we



do justice to this passage without going on too long?" By the time you are reading this newsletter, I will finally be getting the last of the *matzah* crumbs out of the cracks in my dining table and making notes about things I want to change and add to our Passover seder for next year. In the meantime, I hope you all found liberation in your own Exodus, and that the season ahead is filled with renewal and joy.

As spring approaches, our garden volunteers will be kicking into high gear, our grounds will be filled with gorgeous colors and our calendar will be packed with exciting opportunities for study and play. Please watch your weekly emails for details about these upcoming events: a weekend with Dr. Mark Washofsky, this year's Bernstein Scholar-in-Residence, on April 26-28, a Bet Ha'am Bowling Night, a Shabbat in Your Neighborhood event, our annual Teacher Recognition, and more.

Another school year is progressing very quickly. Throughout the year we have encouraged parents to be active participants in our many wonderful programs. Each grade has had family programs in which the parents were either the learners or teachers, or both. I would like to share some of the latest programs along with some photos.

In January, the first graders created a beautiful Jewish museum. The students brought special Jewish items from home and, with the help of teachers Martha Ollove and Elise Richer, made a great display. Parents were invited to the Grand Visit as students introduced their treasures, explaining why they were so special to them.



The last session of the second grade Family Connection was about God. After studying with Rabbi Saks for part of the morning, parents joined their second grader to explore the program stations together. The fifth graders and their parents became residents of the *shtetl* with identities and jobs. We had a rabbi and his family, a matchmaker, a butcher, a farmer and other community figures. We also had Cosaks, who were there to harm and disrupt the lives of the Jews. We all laughed, cried and came away with a better understanding of *shtetl* life.

Looking ahead, I would like to encourage interested parents to visit our classrooms. Our teachers love to share their lessons with you. It is not a secret that we are always looking for new teachers. Visiting the classroom can help to give you an idea of what teaching in our wonderful school is all about!
