

Using a humble, obsolete, construction material: homosote, which is made of compressed, recycled paper is how the substrate was created for these pieces. One might mistakenly refer to this shaped work as organic but there is nothing in the natural world that resembles these. It is the hope of the Artist that the rough nature of this work will find an appeal. They may be seen as immediate in execution, but believe it or not they are well thought out beforehand. The Artist has followed the tried and true path of conferred Art degrees but, perhaps more

importantly, has woven a tapestry of life experiences that certainly informs his work.

UNEARTHING Anne Hebebrand

Fineberg Community Room

"The lyricism in Anne Hebebrand's work can have us thinking about music with associations of color and line in the manner of Paul Klee's paintings and drawings. Her checkerboard and striped blocks of color contrasted with her rhythmic loopy lines start you humming as the artist establishes counterpoint in each individual work." Pamela Ambrose, Founding Director of the Loyola University Museum of Art. Anne Hebebrand's paintings explore a personal narrative relying on instinctual choices of creating overlapping and interlocking shapes. An ongoing exploration of materials, color and process lead to a tactile surface created not only by adding layers, but also by excavating and unearthing earlier layers of paint. The drawn and scratched lines along with rich color create a rhythmic pattern throughout the paintings. Early influences from the artist's childhood in Germany include the

musicality and playfulness of Paul Klee and later on with her move to the United States the freedom and experimentation of the Abstract Expressionists.
