

Coming back to my home town, to have a show at the Maine Jewish Museum, puts me in mind of my roots. Our South Portland neighbors and Jewish friends were like extended family. The resilience of humor, endurance and personal integrity were common themes. My family moved away when I was 10. Maine influences and sensations stuck. I needed to be with these people and to have these landscapes in my eyes. In 1974, I got a summer job in the Mid-coast area, and stayed. There has been much to paint.

The theme of home led me to explore many directions: the visible evidence of climate change, questions of whose home this is, my grandparents' loss of their home country. This show is both a homecoming and a homage.

My father's wartime photographs are powerful in their beauty, and unique in that they were taken by someone who was not a journalist or a historian, but by a man who saw and captured great beauty through a camera lens. The portraits of soldiers on board ship as they prepare to invade North Africa, army officers at a Valentine's Day dance in Rome, townspeople greeting soldiers in the streets, bombed out buildings in Pisa, and donkeys pulling carts across an Algerian backdrop are both sensitive and evocative. When paired with my father's journals, the story is powerful. Together they convey the sense of time and place, the vitality and courage of those young men and women, and the grave expectations placed upon them. Until he died in 2003, these images were hidden. I am committed to sharing his talent and his window onto the world so that more people can see the history my father trapped in cigar boxes.
