

A Message from Rabbi Shub for Pesach 5781

This is year two of the COVID-19 pandemic, and by all appearances, beezrat Hashem, the last time that we will be prevented from gathering with friends and loved ones around a seder table; the last time we bring electronics into our *yom tov*. This year is truly different from all other years.

We do not have to look far in our tradition to find changes to our holiday observance. We do not need to look to any catastrophic events in Jewish history either to find an analogue to the differences that this years Passover holds to normal Pesach celebrations. We can simply read the Mishnah.

If we read the tenth chapter of Mishnah Pesachim, we see that the meal (including the paschal lamb) came right after kiddush, and before *maggid*. Today, we begin by asking questions and studying Torah. The meal comes later. The lamb sacrifice, which was once the central practice of the seder night, was replaced by *maggid* with its four questions, four children, ten plagues, and Dayenu. Torah study supplanted animal sacrifice as the central practice of Judaism and of the first nights of Pesach.

Torah study is more edifying and more inspiring of spiritual and intellectual growth than eating a plate of roasted lamb. The questions that we explore last us a lifetime. And yet we still end each seder by declaring Next year in Jerusalem!

Zoom may bring us the company of those who are far away. Still, we do yearn for a Pesach without it. We will have it. We may need patience, but we will have seder with friends and family again. Next year in person!

Chametz and Matzah

The latest time you can eat *chametz* is 10:12 am on Saturday. Nullify it by 11:29 am on Saturday. Do not eat matzah until the seder. Ashkenazim eat egg matzah before the seder; Sephardim and Mizrachim do not. Rice and other *kitniyot* may be eaten Saturday before the seder.
