Why Would a 21st Century Jew Observe Tisha B'Av?

איכה ישבה בדד העיר רבתי עם התיה כאלמנה רבתי בגוים שרתי במדינות היתה למס

Eikhah! How can it be — that she sat alone, the city so great / so swelled with people?

She was like a widow.

The one great among the nations, ministering among the states, became a slave caste.

-Translation by Rabbi David Seidenberg

And so begins the book of *Eicha*, Lamentations, the scroll that is read on Tisha B'Av.

More like poetry than prose, this scroll cries out with the inconsolable grief felt by those who witnessed the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem. Eicha speaks of a grief known to people who have lost all, or most of the things that they value and that bring them joy.

פני זקנים לא נהדרו:

בחורים טחון נשאו ונערים בעץ כשלו: זקנים משער שבתו בחורים מנגינתם: שבת משוש לבנו נהפך לאבל מחלנו:

No respect has been shown to elders. Young men must carry millstones, and youths stagger under loads of wood. The old men are gone from the gate, the young men from their music. Gone is the joy of our hearts; our dancing is turned into mourning. (5:12b-14)

Like many who have experienced illness or loss, the writer tries to make sense of a devastating situation — 'Why has God done this to us?' 'Why me?' 'If God truly cares about us, how could God let this happen? Like those who have experienced loss, feelings of loneliness, despair and hopelessness pervade the

author's thinking. If prayer helped him before, it does no good now. God seems to have abandoned him. His only hope is to figure out why he is afflicted and then find a solution.

אני הגבר ראה עני במחשכים הושיבני

I am the man who has known affliction...(3:1)
He has made me dwell in darkness...(3:6)
And when I cry and plead, He shuts out my prayer (3:8)

The answer offered is not an answer that I find comforting, but is an answer that a person who believes in God's absolute omnipotence might find helpful:

נחנו פשענו ומרינו אתה לא סלחת:

We have transgressed and rebelled, and You have not forgiven (3:42)

The author suggests that the people have sinned and therefore their punishment is national and personal destruc-

RECENT BOARD ACTIONS

Committee Authorized to begin Reconfiguration Search: At the July 15 meeting of the Board of Directors, the Board completed its review of the Reconfiguration Committee's recommendations regarding alternative religious professional staffing models, and included in this review an analysis of the cost of each of the Committee's proposed models. The Board voted unanimously to authorize the commencement of a search for 1.5 full time equivalent religious professionals. The Board voted to provide the Search Committee with the flexibility to consider a variety of scenarios. The Search Committee will seek applications from rabbis, cantors and Jewish educators and from the pool of qualified candidates will then determine which candidate(s) have the most appropriate skill set to assist Rabbi Braun with the educational, liturgical, and pastoral needs of our synagogue. The Board will have the opportunity to vote on any recommended hiring before offers of

employment are extended. We plan to have this new Search Committee in place this summer with the goal of having new hires in place by July 1, 2009. We will provide you with updates as the Search Committee's work progresses.

■ Membership Dues Remain Level: On June 24th, the Board voted to keep dues at the same level for the third year in a row. While we expect this to be a tight budgetary year as some of our synagogue's expenses have increased (including but not limited to our energy costs), we have done our best to keep expenses to a minimum because we understand that every TBE member is feeling the pinch of rising living expenses. To balance our budget, we will need a strong Annual Campaign this fall to match or exceed the successful campaign we had last year. Please support that annual appeal at whatever level

tion and pain. When the people discover their sins, they will repent and all their ills will be taken away. On that day, God will again take them in and care for them and all will be well. The pain that is so keenly felt can be controlled through a better relationship with God - a taskthat can be achieved.

Even though the language and emotion of Eicha is beautiful, and the melody used to chant the words are both awesome and haunting, why would a 21st century Jew observe Tisha B'Av? Do we really see the destruction of the Temple as a catastrophe? Do we really believe that God controls the political sphere (the expansion of the Roman Empire) and that God would treat us so harshly?

The destruction of the Temple – and with it a form of biblical Judaism is only one way to think of the observance of Tisha b'Av. Another reason is the way it models a Jewish approach to disaster. We do not sit alone, but rather with community as we recall and mourn devastating events that have occurred over history. Like many mourning rituals, there is comfort sitting with friends while we ponder events that are overwhelmingly horrible. I remember listening to Rabbi Irwin Kula chanting the final words of passengers from the airplane that crashed in Pennsylvania on September 11st to the melody of Eicha. I wondered if the Jews in exile who listened to the words of Eicha also felt a lump in their throat and feelings of helplessness and despair as I did when I heard the passenger's messages. I wondered if they, too, found comfort being with community at such a difficult time.

Perhaps another reason to observe is to remind us that even if we are relatively comfortable, this is still a broken world in need of repair, and we need to take notice of it. One Rabbinic story teaches that the reason the Temple was destroyed was because one Jew treated another Jew with contempt. Tisha B'Av and its liturgy reminds us of the sanctity of life — of all life. It reminds us just how destructive hatred and bitterness can be. It reminds us of homelessness, of loss, of exile, and the effects of poverty.

My being melts away over the ruin of my poor people, as babes and sucklings languish in the squares of the city. They keep asking their mothers, 'Where is bread and wine?' as they languish like battle-wounded in the squares of the town (2:11b-12a)

Perhaps on this one day, when we recall all the terrible events that have happened to the Jewish people, we can be moved to action. We can do something about the atrocities taking place in many areas of the world. We can increase the amount of food and clothing we bring to the Temple so that others may share our wealth. We can organize, we can cry out, we can vote in ways that may bring a moment of peace where there is violence.

As we chant the book of Eicha, as we listen to the readings, as we look over the Casco Bay - past the Headlight and towards the Atlantic Ocean, may we be moved to work for a better world.
