Haifa: City of Stepsis an intimate and revelatory journey through the authors native city. With an expert hand, Nili Gold offers a guided tour through Haifaduring its heyday in the 1920s and 30s as an international port and cultural center through the 1948 war and the cityssubsequentdecline. She weaves together urban, architectural landmarks and Haifas mountainous topography with literary masterpieces to elucidate how a childhood landscape is imprinted in memory. Pulitzer Prize-winning author Robert Caro lauded Golds book on this subject as beautifully written and impeccably researched a true contribution to the literature of cities. Nili Gold is Professor of Modern Hebrew Language and Literature at the University of Pennsylvania.



Since its founding in 1948, Israel has played an important role in the Jewish American imagination. But the Jewish state has come to mean very different things to different segments of the American Jewish community. Perhaps not surprisingly, many twentieth-century Jewish American writers steered clear of the topic, focusing instead on the

Holocaust or on Jewish life in America. In the last five years, however, a new generation of Jewish American writers, including Nicole Krauss, Nathan Englander, Joshua Cohen, and Jonathan Safran Foer, have turned their attention to the relationships between American Jews and the State of Israel. What do these contemporary writers have to say about this fraught and complex connection? How do they imagine Israels influence on Jewish American identity today?

Anthony Wexler (PhD, Johns Hopkins University) studies postwar American literature, specializing in Jewish literature and the Holocaust in American life. He has held research and teaching fellowships at Colby College, the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, Johns Hopkins University, and Northwestern University. He has also studied traditional Jewish texts at yeshivas in Israel and New York. His current book project is titled *At a Distance of Years: The Novel of Aging in the Shadow of Auschwitz.* In it, he examines how a group of late-life novels challenge the ways the Holocaust has been received and represented in American life.
