At camp I've learned to help Israel to become a rich land, both materially and culturally. Giving to charities which will benefit the people in Israel is urged and encouraged.





At times I thought I'd never do it, but I practiced and all at once it came to me. Although I didn't get to paddle a canoe, I don't feel bad because I want to wait until I am qualified.

I've seen a lot of wonderful things happen at the waterfront since Visiting Day. I saw the Camp Lava boys defeat Camp Medin by over 20 points at Medin. The Lava boys swam sterling races. I watched the girls prepare for a swim meet, but unfortunately it was never held because the opposition didn't show up.

This year I saw a new aquatic device used. It was an aqua-plane which was made to order by Warren Goldberg and tested by David Vinegar. It worked real fine and looked like great fun. I couldn't use it because I'm not a deep water swimmer, but if I get into deep water next season I'll be able to use the aqua-plane and even the water skis.

The boys and girls that passed this test not only learned beginners skills, but displayed them in water over their heads. Over 40 campers passed the A.R.C. Intermediate Test. They learned 3 types of strokes and swam for five minutes without stopping. I am proud to be a holder of an Intermediate card.

Over 30 people completed a swimmer course. This is swimming some distance with perfect basic strokes plus competency in diving and treading.

All season long I watched a group of 11 boys and girls work daily on life saving skills. They learned and practiced life saving techniques under all types of conditions. Each person is now capable of taking care of himself and has the ability to aid or rescue anyone in danger of drowning, if rescue is humanly possible, by the best and safest method applying to the situation. I alrivo and take off my hat to: Sue Boan, Steve Blatt, Larry Bloom, Alan Dubrow, Warren Goldberg, Harriet Harris, Paul Vogel, Richard Frisch, Dave Vinegar, Barbara Zimmerman.

I would like to give a great big "HURRAY" especially to David Zimmerman, a 9 year old boy, who successfully audited the course. He remained interested throughout the course and practiced very hard, even though he realized that he was too young to receive a Jr. Life Saving Card.

With camp drawing to a close, I can say that this was a great year. Even though the weather man was not always on our side, I saw a great deal accomplished at the Lown Waterfront. Instruction was fun, and we learned a lot. Racing, boating, and canoeing were wonderful too. I am sorry to have to leave, but next year is another season. 
CINDERELLA


In the younger girls Robin Striar, Marcia Dubrow, Anne Lown and Ellen Saltz excelled in dodgeball, kickball and softball.
